Prexy Hopes PCC Will Put House In Order at Portland Meeting

Pullman, Wash. —(U.P.)—Dr. Emmett Moore, president of the Pacific Coast conference, said today he hopes the conference

"will put its athletic house in order" at its meeting Monday and Tuesday in Portland.

Washington, U.C.L.A., Southern California and California have been punished for violating conference regulations dealing with payments to athletes.

Critics of the discipline contend the conference code is not realistic because the \$100 monthly limit in aid to athletes does not meet the cost of living at member schools.

Changes Possible
"I suppose changes are possible, but I don't know," Moore said. "I just hope the representatives will take care of the whole problem."

He did not disclose that nature of any possible changes which might be recommended at Portland.

The representatives will report to the school presidents Wednesday and review the Portland meeting. Then the presidents are expected to outline future policy.

Simple Black Box May Answer Termite Problem

Los Angeles —(U.P.)—A simple black box that sends out "death rays" may be the answer to the problem of household termites and post beetles. The box, developed at the University of California at Los Angeles, utilizes infra-red radiation which can destroy the bugs in five to 10 minutes of exposure, right through the flooring. It's an easily constructed device, which can be built cheaply in the workshop of any pest-control operator.

Boat Sinks While Approaching Harbor

Sydney, Australia —(U.P.)—The 600-ton collier Birchgrove Park turned turtle and sank early today just six miles from safe harbor after a 100-mile trip through stormy seas.

Rescue vessels reported four of her 14-man crew rescued, nine drowned and one missing. Officer W. Gosling of the South Head Signal Station said the ship simply vanished in the pre-dawn darkness while he was signaling it instructions for entering Sydney Harbor.

Survivors said the cargo of 444 tons of coal taken aboard at Newcastle shifted in the heavy seas and dragged the 26-year-old vessel over on her side. She had

Modernization of UN Korea Forces Favored

Seoul, Korea —(U.P.)—Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, said today he favored "modernization" of United Nations forces in Korea.

Radford arrived in Seoul from Formosa. He told newsmen at the airport that "sooner or later" time to flash only a quick SOS before going down.
