Eager Audience Sees 'Romeo and Juliet' At Ashland Festival

An eager audience nearly filled the Elizabethan theater at Ashland Friday night at the third Shakespearean Festival production of the season, "Romeo and Juliet."

The production, one of the world's most beloved dramas of romance and tragedy, held the blanket-wrapped audience nearly spellbound throughout the cold, starlit evening.
Ted van Griethuysen of Houston, Tex., and Rosalyn Newport, Carnegie Tech student, both looked and acted their parts as Romeo and Juliet with a striking degree of perfection. Both lead characters have had considerable theater experience, which combined with obvious talent, makes them perfect selections for the roles.

Commendable Job
Director Allen Fletcher, who also appeared as Montague, did a commendable job in casting Romeo and Juliet as well as the others in the tragedy.

One of the best received characters in last night's performance was Alice Lauterer in the part of Juliet's nurse. Miss Lauterer, a newcomer to the festival and former teacher and director of

drama at Mills college, seemed to reach every member of the audience with her heart-warming performance. It seems doubtful that even Shakespeare would have thought the part could contain such sparkle and polish.
The role of another beloved character, quick-witted Mercutio, was carried out in admirable style by David O'Brien. A Stanford University student from Glencoe, Ill., O'Brien accented humor and personality Shakespeare wrote into the part. Mercutio's untimely death from the rapier of Tybalt seemed to arouse more than the usual amount of audience sympathy because of O'Brien's winning performance.

Sterling Performance
Friar Laurence (B. Iden Payne) also gave a sterling performance as did Montague (Allen Fletcher) his lady (Doris Viola), Capulet (James Parker), his lady (Kessie G. Baird), Paris (Michael F. Irreson), Tybalt (William Oyler) and Capulet's three servants, Sampson, Gregory and Peter (Steve Pavlisin, Richard Cavette and Philip Jacobus).

James Grant Kahlo, appearing as the elderly cousin of Capulet, did a fine job in an important lesser part. He supplied essential atmosphere by his presence, but did not overplay the part to the detriment of other major characters.

Also deserving "pats on the back" were other members of the cast, Escalus (Richard Graham), Benvolio (Eberle Thomas), Balthasar (Jack J. Swanson), Abraham and Friar John (Hugh Wilson), the Apothecary (Brad Curtis), the two pages (Michael Cotton and Rudolf E. Vest Jr.), musicians (Art Silva, Vest, Jerry Holloway and Lee Haring), guards and watchmen (Curtis, Haring and Holloway) and citizens and maskers (Joan Kugell, Nancy Pickhardt, Ann Brennan, Susan L. Shively, Silva and Wilson).

Costuming, Props
Make-up, costuming and props were excellent. Only two factors seemed to detract from the production. The most serious element of detracting was the regrettable amount of noise, both from moving props and backstage voices, immediately prior to the last scene. Also, at a few brief intervals the audience had some difficulty in hearing two or three of the plays.

Last night the festival group presented "Cymbeline" and tonight will present the second performance of "Richard III." Curtain time is 8:30 p.m. Unless night temperature takes a sudden climb, it is recommended that theater-goers bring along blankets or warm wraps to ward off the night chill.—R.J.B.

James Dale Criswell was bucking timber with Edward Scroggins, who was the faller. The victim's bride is in the service as a WAC.

According to Clackamas County Coroner Leslie R. Peake, a falling fir tree struck a young alder and glanced off, striking Criswell with the butt, pinning him to the ground.

Peake said the accident happened on Twin Fir road on property owned by John Jaeger.

Ciswell was employed by the Al and Kenneth Valberg Logging Company. He has been living with his mother, while his wife was in the service, at Eagle Creek.
