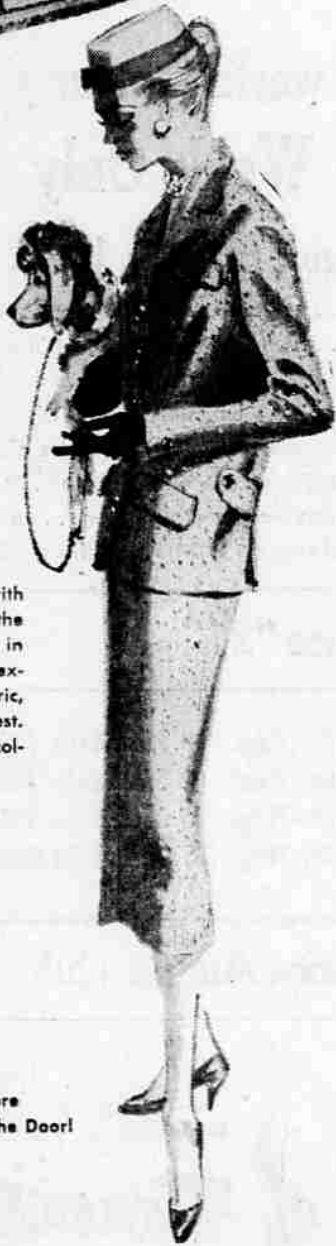
Traveler Returns
