New York — (UP) — A week in Manhattan:

Most startling sight in Fifth Avenue college shops just opening for girls eager to get their back-to-campus wardrobes: Colorful skin tight leotards.

College girls hired to help one store sell its campus clothes wear the leotards in bright green, red, blue or black under-knee-length wool skirts. Called "glamour gams," the leotards are made of nylon stretch yarn so they fit snugly from waist to toes.

They'll be worn under Bermuda shorts on campuses too, a college clothes expert predicted, and used as dormitory lounge pants with matching blouses.

A sandwich won an Omaha, Neb., woman two tickets to Europe and \$1,000 this week.

Mrs. Fern Snider entered a man-sized cheese, corned beef, sauerkraut and rye bread sandwich in a national sandwich idea contest and won first prize over some 600 other entries.

At an all-sandwich lunch here to announce winners Mrs. Snider burst into tears as she picked up her prize. She supports her children and invalid husband by cooking in a bowling alley restaurant in Omaha.

Judges for the contest, sponsored by the National Restaurant association, had a few bad moments too. They nibbled their way through some astonishing entries, including one sandwich made of peanut butter and chocolate bars broiled under a low flame.
