New York—(U.P.)—Stocks advanced in all major divisions today with utilities setting a new low on a dividend cut.

Gains in the main list amounted to one to two points. The outstanding exception, S. H. Kress, fell more than seven points to a new low on a dividend cut.

Railroad issues lagged behind other sections with several of the issues easier. Santa Fe started strong but ended by losing its gain. Kansas City Southern held a rise of a point and Southern Railway was up more than one.

Oil shares started all day with gains ranging to more than 4 points in Gulf Oil.
