Task Force Struggles Through Icy Water To Supply Dewline

Seattle — (U.P.) — A 56-ship task force carrying 6800 men is making its way through icy waters off Point Barrow, Alaska, this week carrying supplies to dewline radar stations across the top of the continent.

It is a long, hard trip for the men — two months with leave and heavy work in sub-zero weather.

Danger of Ice

And there is always the danger of becoming icebound in Arctic waters.

Only during a short period—about Aug. 7 to Sept. 25—are the northern waters navigable. After that, ice closes in.

In a similar operation last year, 52 ships received major damage from the ice.

"It was pretty rugged last year," Rear Admiral G. C. Townner, commander of the operation, admitted as his task force left Seattle last month. "We didn't know whether we were going to get out or not. In fact, we didn't get out five minutes before we needed to. The ice punched a hole in my own flagship."

Would Be Marooned

Any ship caught in the ice would be marooned for another year.

Townner hopes to get out earlier this year and has set Sept. 15 as a target date for return to Seattle.

"But we'll need good luck," he added.

The supplies being carried include bulk oil, construction material, and electronic equipment. Sites to be serviced reach from Cape Lisburne, Alaska to Shepherd Bay, Canada — approximately 2000 miles.



Demos Will Start Balloting Thursday

Chicago — (U.P.) — Delegates to the Democratic National Convention will start balloting for the party's 1956 presidential nominee shortly after 9 a.m. (PST) Thursday, Aug. 16.

The party's National Committee announced that balloting is scheduled to continue in the night session, beginning shortly after 5 p.m. (PST). The windup of the entire convention is slated for Friday night, Aug. 17, after speeches by the presidential nominee and former President Truman.

Delegates will vote for the vice presidential nominee in the Friday day session.

The report of the Resolutions and Platform committee, which is in session throughout the present pre-convention week, is slated for the night session of Aug. 15.

There will be daily sessions beginning 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. (PST) each day Monday through Friday, except Wednesday when only a night session is scheduled.

Thornton Answers Crosby Questions

Portland — (U.P.) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton yesterday made public a letter mailed to Clyde C. Crosby, teamster official, in answer to questions put to him by Crosby earlier.

Crosby had asked the Attorney General just before the end of the nine-week vice probe conducted by the Multnomah county grand jury, whether James B. Elkins and some of his cohorts had been granted immunity by the panel.

Thornton wrote:

"On the basis of the events of the past several days, I know you will concur with my statement that the grand jury and my department have diligently and conscientiously bent their efforts to indict all those apparently guilty of wrongdoing.

"The cooperation of the teamster organizations will be welcome so that public authorities can close this matter by successful prosecutions of the indictees."
