Alice—He should accept a job form dad.
Dan—I want her to gamble on me.
Alice—We have been married five years but have no children. My husband's confidence in the future seems shaken. He has tried and given up a number of jobs in the last five years, and has not yet succeeded in earning enough money to justify my quitting my job.
I would be perfectly willing to encourage him and keep on working until he has made good, but my father has just told us that he wants to retire soon and would like to take my husband into his business. He offers to give him a good starting salary, so that we could start raising a family right away.
I can understand Dan's preferring to make his own way, but I do feel the years are slipping away from us, and I would like to help him. After all, I am the only child, and I know my parents would be happier helping us than seeing us flounder.
Dan—I would certainly not turn down help, but I do not want charity. I do not feel as though I am cut out for my father-in-law's business, nor do I believe he thinks so. He is simply planning to give me a handout.
I have had bad luck with jobs

so far, but I have ideas and am willing to keep on trying. I am also willing to resign my dreams and take any kind of job if Alice will agree to quit work and raise a family. But she insists that our economic problem must be solved first.
If my father-in-law offered to help me establish myself in a business I felt fit to manage, I would be grateful for the help. But I cannot ask him after my record of failures, and Alice does not want to take any chances about having a family.

The Medical Roundup

Causes of Hay Fever and Asthma
In a recent article Dr. Selma Hebal, of New York City, pointed out that skin work best in young persons.
In about half of them the skin will react to one or more substances. Asthmatic persons over 40 years of age are not likely to respond well to skin tests: they are more likely to be suffering from some chronic infection of the lungs, or from emphysema, in which there is a dilation of the tiny air sacs in the lung, or from a failing heart, or a combination of troubles.

The so-called allergens most commonly used in the injection treatment of patients with hay fever are pollens, house dust, chicken, duck and goose feathers, dog, cat, rabbit or horse dander, and the spores of certain molds.
According to Dr. Hebal, dusts are probably the most common agents which irritate the nose or the lungs. The skin of practically all allergic people responds to house dust.

Trouble due to the spores of molds can often be recognized by the fact that the hay-fever-like symptoms are present through much of the year. Similarly, a long-lasting hay fever can be due to cotton-seed and kapok fiber in the house. They are used in furniture, mattresses, and stuffed toys. In such cases the offending article should quickly be removed from the home. I remember a man, asthmatic for years, who was almost cured the day one pillow was removed from his davenport. It contained goose feathers to which he was highly allergic. I remember a girl whose bad asthma was cured the day her mother gave away the house cat. Quit Eating It!

According to Dr. Hebal, desensitization with injections is unnecessary for foods, except the cereals which are being inhaled by bakers and cooks. If a person finds out by experimenting and keeping a diary that he is sensitive to some food, the best thing to do is to quit eating it.
In the northeastern part of the United States hay fever has three seasons. In the Spring the trouble is due to tree pollens, and some relief may be obtained by desensitization with injections. In the middle of May to the middle of July the trouble is usually caused by grass pollens. In the late season, which runs from early August until the first frost, the trouble is most commonly due to ragweeds.

Leppers Are Unfairly Treated
At the recent international conference for the defense and social rehabilitation of lepers, Dr. J. G. Prieto, of Madrid, Spain, appealed to people all over the world to be more kind and fair and understanding with the cured leper. As he said, often after a man has been entirely cured of the disease, even his own family will refuse to have anything to do with him. It is most unfortunate that laymen have such a terrible and unjustified fear of this disease. They act as if it were as contagious as measles or smallpox, when, actually, it may not be contagious at all.

To illustrate: A while ago, when I was visiting in the leper settlement on Molokai, in the Hawaiian Islands, the resident physician told me of a man who, years ago, came there to nurse his wife who had a bad case of leprosy. When she died, he married another leper woman, and when she died he married still another. He lived with five leprosy wives, one after the other, and never caught the disease from them! Another man in the same settlement lived with three leprosy wives, one after the other, and did not catch the disease. No Fear of Disease
My father, who was one of the world's experts on leprosy, and was in charge of research on lepers in Honolulu many years ago, never had any fear of the disease.
Today, fortunately, with the help of the sulfone drugs, a high percentage of lepers have their disease arrested. They get well just as a man with tuberculosis gets well after treatment with isoniazid, streptomycin, and other drugs. When a leper is cured, he is cured just as a person is cured of any other disease; and then there is no reason why people should have any fear of him. Actually, as I have inferred, it is very questionable if people should have any fear of him when his disease is active. Many experts on leprosy—the persons who really know about the dis-

ease—have never had any desire to isolate the patients and lock them up. This has been done simply because of popular ignorance and the great prejudice that has come down from Biblical times.
