

Newcombe Posts 9th Win In Row; 3 Knotted For Lead In Tam Play

Big Don Hurls 39 2-3 Blank Cantos

Big Don Newcombe allowed only two hits in pitching the Brooklyn Dodgers to a 5-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Saturday, but one of those hits snapped his consecutive string of scoreless innings at 39 2/3.

Newcombe started the game with 33 1/3 straight shutout innings to his credit. He blanked the Phillies without a hit for six and one-third innings but with one out in the seventh, Marv Blaylock singled and Stan Lopata followed with a homer into the left field seats.

Although his chances of breaking Carl Hubbell's National league record of 46 1/3 straight scoreless innings now was shattered, Newcombe bore down harder than ever as he went on to post his ninth victory in a row and his 18th of the season.

The Dodger hitters, meanwhile, backed up Newcombe by scoring four of their five runs on homers. Randy Jackson hit a three-run circuit clout in the first inning and Duke Snider followed with his 32nd homer in the eighth with none aboard.

Willard Schmidt of the St. Louis Cardinals also turned in a neat pitching job against the Chicago Cubs, allowing only four hits as the Cardinals triumphed, 3-1. Schmidt set the Cubs down with two singles in the first eight innings but needed relief help from Jackie Colburn in the ninth when Dee Fondy led off with a triple and scored on a single by Monte Irvin.

The Cardinals picked up their three runs in the seventh on a walk, a single by Whitey Lockman, a double by Bobby Morgan and a sacrifice.

Red Schoendienst collected three hits and scored twice on singles by Dusty Rhodes to earn the New York Giants a 4-2 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Southpaw Johnny Antonelli registered his 10th victory of the season, although he was chased in the sixth inning when the Pirates scored both their runs.

The Baltimore Orioles banged out 11 hits, including three by Tito Francona, in defeating the New York Yankees, 10-5. Hector (Skinny) Brown limited the Yankees to seven hits, one

Burkemo Has 66 for Day's Low Score

Chicago—(U.P.)—Money pressure bothered the front-runners in Tam O'Shanter's "World Tourney Saturday and Walter Burkemo, Ted Kroll and Australian Peter Thomson ended with the nine under par 207's to share the lead after 54 holes.

However, they had no bulge on the field for deadlocked one stroke behind them were Marty Furgol, Bill Casper, Jr., and Jerry Barber at 208, while at 209 there was the five way tie, Mike Souchak, Fred Hawkins, Jay Herbert, Johnny Palmer and Bill Nary.

Both of the 36-hole front runners were hurt by the pace in the chase for the \$50,000 top prize in the \$101,200 tournament. Bo Winner, tied with Cary Middlecoff for the midway lead at 135, blew to a horrible 76 for a 211 total while Middlecoff scrambled all the way to a 75 for a 210 score, sinking a 20 foot chip on the 18th green to save one stroke.

Burkemo, from Franklin, Mich., had the hottest round of the day among the leaders, a six under par 66 which lifted him from the pack into the pace-setting position. Thomson, who had been one stroke off after 36 holes, had his worst round of the tournament, a 71, but still managed to stay in the battle, while Kroll, also a stroke off with Thomson at the midway marker, matched that tally.

Betty Jameson, San Antonio, Tex., knocked three strokes off par with a 73 to take the lead in the women pro division with a 54 hole total of 222, six under par.

She held a two-stroke edge over another veteran, Patty Berg, Chicago, and a young newcomer, Marlene Bauer Hage, each with 224. Miss Berg had the best women's round of the day, a 72, Saturday, while Mrs. Hage turned in a 75.

Trailing this trio was women's open champion, Kathy Cornelius, Lake Worth, Fla., with a 76 for a 227, while there was a three-way tie for fifth at 228, the midway leader, Mickey Wright, Chula Vista, Calif., who slipped to an 82 today, Louise Suggs, Sea Island, Ga., and Alice Bauer, Sarasota, Fla., each with a 77 Saturday.

The midway leader in both the men's and women's amateur divisions held on to first place. Anne Richardson, Columbus, O., tallied an 81 for a 250 total, four strokes up on Carol Jo Kessler, Roseburg, Ore., who had a 78 Saturday, best score in the group, while third place was held by Jackie Yates, the former national collegiate champion from Honolulu, with an 80 for 255.

In the men's amateur, Ward Wettlaufer netted a 73 for a 216 mark, even par for 54 holes, and a five-stroke edge over Martin Stanovich, Chicago, who also had a 73 Saturday for 221. Al Barkow, Chicago, was third with a 76 for 222.

While only four squad members were whacking the horsehide for the league season at a 300 or better average, several players with lesser averages have been getting their share of hits for the Medford Cheney Studs lately. The Southern Oregon loop leaders have been hitting well as a team and every man right down through the lineup is potential trouble for opposing pitchers. Lower average hitters sparking up has been a big boost to the Studs in their successful efforts to stay in front in the circuit.

Twink Pederson, who has a season mark of .208, hit five for 10 for 500 last week end against Coos Bay-North Bend to share slugging honors with Terry Maddox, the Studs' top hitter, who slammed eight for 16. Jerry Bettendorf, whose short season mark is .200 at the plate, socked six for 14 in the CB-NB series. Among the leading hitters, Jack Cooney and John Koven, continued their pace along with Maddox with 6 for 11 and five for 15, respectively.

As a team in the Lumberjack series, Medford got 37 hits in 110 at bats for a .336 team average, compared to their .267 standing for the full season.

GREAT CATCHES

Dick Toney and Jack Cooney, who headed off the Medford batting order against Coos Bay didn't have much chance to fatten their batting averages in the Sunday game. Each drew three walks in the five times they stepped to the platter.

LANE STEALS SIGNS
When Coos Bay-North Bend dumped Coquille 15 to 1 recently in non-league play, Don Lane was given the big share of the credit in his role as a base coach. By the time the 'Jacks had bat-

ted around once, he had the signals of Catcher Pete Goodbrod to the Coquille pitcher figured out. After that the Lumberjacks knew what to look for on about every pitch. Lane must have been at it again last week when the 'Jacks downed the Loggers again 20 to 7. Coquille pitchers did issue 13 walks but CB-NB collected 15 hits, too.

SHOULD BE MORE INTEREST
Softball enthusiasm in this vicinity has dwindled away considerably in recent years—at least from a fan standpoint. After seeing the season end playoffs of the Jackson County Softball association, one wonders why there is not more interest. The last two games of the double-elimination tourney were particularly outstanding tussles in fan appeal and were well-played. They were worthy of a larger audience than the small crowd of mostly players' families who gathered at Hawthorne park.

Cleveland Browns Trounce College All-Stars 26 to 0
Chicago—(U.P.)—An "ordinary" pro offense, which included a record four field goals by Lou (The Toe) Groza, was more than good enough to whip the 1956 College All-Stars, Coach Paul Brown of the Cleveland Browns said today.

"Our defense looked a lot better than it did in last year's game," he said, overlooking the 1955 loss by a 30-27 score when he had averaged it by Friday night's 26-0 count. "Our offense was just ordinary."

The Browns displayed expert basic football, though, intercepting two of the All-Stars' 10 passes and permitting the collegians to complete only two attempts for 12 yards.

Recover Two Fumbles
It was good basic football, too, when the pros recovered two

of three All-Star fumbles, held the collegiate offense to 121 yards rushing and gave Groza fine protection for his four field goals.

Groza kicked the ball over the crossbars from the 45, 37, 31 and 34 yard lines as well as converting after both Cleveland touchdowns to ring up 14 points for the night, an individual performance eclipsed only by Don Hutson's 19 points for Green Bay in 1940.

It was a new All-Star game record for field goals, too, both for an individual and for a team. The individual mark was set by Ohio State's Tad Weed when he kicked three field goals for the All-Stars last year. The mark had been set by a team in 1939 when Ward Cuff kicked one field goal and Kenn Strong two in a 9-0 New York Giants win.
