## Refugee Family Arrives in City

New arrivals in Medford are the Jerzy Muller family who live at 343 South Grape street. The Polish family was brought here from England by the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief sponsored by the First Methodist church. The local church applied for a refugee family two years ago.

The Mullers, Jerzy and Emilia and the three children Henryk, 8, Ryszard, 7, and Danusia, 15, arrived in Medford July 28. Mr. Muller is employed by the Elk Lumber company.

Mrs. Muller, who speaks Ukrainian, Russian, Polish, and English fluently, and some German, was moved from Poland in 1943 to Germany. It was prior to this time that her first husband was forced into the Russian army and reported killed in 1941. After living in Germany for four years she managed to get to England but had to spend the next three years fighting official red tape so her young daughter, Danusia Kosecka, could join her there.

Mr. Muller, who claims speaking knowledge of only Polish, German and English, served with the First Independent Polish Brigade under British command as a paratrooper until the war's end. He then transferred to the occupation forces in Germany with the Polish Regiment

corps. It was during his four years there that he met his wife. After living in several DP camps in Germany they managed to get to England where he married Emilia in 1947. They lived in Manchester, England, for nine years where Mr. Muller was employed by the British railways.

In 1950 the couple made application to come to the United States. After getting a sponsor through the British Council of Churches this year, the First Methodist church here, they were flown from London to New York by the World Council of Churches. The local church paid the family's expenses from New York to Medford. On their trip here they spent several days in Chicago where Mrs. Muller's mother has lived for four years.

The local church arranged, prior to their arrival, for a house for the family, a job for Mr. Muller, and furniture and some food for the family. Chairman of the Committees on Missions at the church is Mrs. Jessie Minear. Other committee members who were instrumental in the Muller's arrival here were Mr. and Mrs. Dale Newton, and O. P. Taylor.

Now that they have accepted America as their new home, the Mullers use the American equivalent for their given names. Jerzy Muller is now George Muller, Henryk has dropped the "k", and Ryszard is Richard.
