

# South All-Stars Flail North, 10-5; Crandall Regains Home Run Touch

## Usher Leads Hit Tirade Over North

Portland, Ore. — (U.P.) — The Southern All-Stars of the Pacific Coast League unleashed a 14-hit batting attack to win a 10 to 5 victory over the Northern All-Stars in the annual charity classic Monday night.

It was the eighth win for the South in the 12 times the game has been played. A crowd of 10,437 fans watched the game, far short of the record turnout in Los Angeles nine years ago when 19,851 fans were on hand.

San Francisco's Russ Kemmerer took credit for the win. Seattle's Howie Judson was tagged with the loss.

The North broke into the scoring column only in the third inning, when San Francisco's R. W. Smith had some trouble controlling the ball. The Northeners scored all their five runs then.

Sparkling the southerners' attack was Bob Usher, San Diego rightfielder who had three for five, including a triple, a double and a single.

Manager Bill Sweeney of the North sent three hurlers to the mound in an attempt to quell the riot, but they yielded a total of 14 hits to the southland batters.

Manager Bob Scheffing of the southerners trailed for five innings, then got going and were never headed.

In the second, Usher tripled to right center to score Eddie Kazak of San Diego. Casey Wise of Los Angeles followed with a single that scored Usher.

In the fourth inning, Jim Boiger of Los Angeles singled to right, scoring big Steve Bilko, of Los Angeles, and Kazak.

Two frames later, George Freese of Los Angeles hit the game's only homer. Then Usher doubled and Haywood Sullivan of San Francisco drew a base on balls. Wise singled to score Usher and Sullivan came home when Vancouver's Jim Pisoni let the ball get away from him in centerfield. A double by Spook Jacobs of Hollywood scored Wise.

In the eighth, singles by Jacobs, Bob Speake of the Angels and Dick Sisler of San Diego brought in two more runs.

 New York — (U.P.) — Baseball's "pension dissension" was all but forgotten today as players and club owners took final steps to assure veteran major leaguers of the rosier future ever offered any group of professional athletes.

The four-man pension committee of two players and two club bosses met for three hours Monday to incorporate new benefits into the present plan, which will be made possible by the new contract for commercial sponsorship of the World Series and All-Star game on radio and TV beginning in 1957.

"We had a harmonious meeting in which we worked out detailed plans that will be submitted to the players on each team through their player representatives," said Bob Feller of Cleveland, the American League's chief representative met with owner John Galbreath of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Joe Cronin, general manager of the Boston Red Sox.

**Bout Billed For Heavyweights**

 The return of Del Crandall's home run touch, which left him for 54 straight days before he regained it, is the latest item to boom Milwaukee's pennant stock, along with the pitching of their young phenom, Taylor Phillips.

Crandall and Phillips, the Milwaukee battery, ran as an entry in Monday night's 5-1 victory over the Cincinnati Redlegs, and they didn't need much help from anyone else. It was the third victory in the vital four game set with the Redlegs and put Milwaukee two full games in front again. Second place Brooklyn was rained out after one inning against the Giants and the losing Redlegs in third place dropped four full games off the pace.

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## Delinquent Giant Begs Forgiveness

New York — (U.P.) — Penitent Jim Mangan, a third string catcher who wanted to play every day, sought forgiveness today from Bill Rigney of the New York Giants, whom he had described as "the worst manager in baseball."

Mangan was suspended indefinitely for jumping the Giants Sunday in Pittsburgh during a double header, then "popping off" about Rigney when he returned to fly back to New York with his teammates.

Rigney said Mangan came to him and "the kid begged me not to run him out of baseball."

But he said he could not take any action on his suspension because that was invoked by Giant President Horace Stoneham.

"I really feel sorry for him," Rigney said. "You have to like a kid who wants to play baseball as badly as he did. He just got down in the dumps and did something that was very stupid."

It was not the first time the 26-year-old Mangan had been involved in a brush with his bosses. While he was with Pittsburgh he sounded off against Branch Rickey, then general manager, and acknowledged later, to Rickey himself, that he was the player who had scribbled some naughty words on a club house notice. Rickey had posted the notice.

Rickey sent the youngster to their Class C El Paso team where he became involved in an argument with an umpire, was fined \$100 and jumped the club on that occasion, too.

 Old Satchel Paige admits that "baseball is just a job with me," and what a job he's doing these days for the Miami Marlins in the International League!

The one-time major-leaguer, who claims he's "only 50-years old" but probably is closer to 55, just missed pitching a seven-inning, no-hit, no-run game Monday night as the Marlins defeated the Rochester Red Wings, 4-0, in the opener of a doubleheader.

Right-fielder Tom Burgess ruined Paige's no-hit bid with a fourth inning single. The ageless Satch walked two men and struck out three in running his season record to 10 victories against only three defeats.

Paige said he "felt good" over his latest star performance because it "showed everyone" he can still start and finish games. He added he used no fast balls against the Red Wings.

"I was just throwing my screwballs, hesitation tosses and my other original pitches," he quipped.

In the second game, Rochester bounced back to defeat the Marlins, 8-0, behind Vern Mackinson and Cot Deal's combined three-hitter, Connie Marrero, another old-timer, pitched Havana to a 4-1 victory over Buffalo, while Richmond turned back Montreal, 8-3, Toronto and Columbus were not scheduled.
