

Nuxhall's Victory Over Cubs Snaps Redleg Losing Streak; Braves, Dodgers Drop Tiffs

Joe Nuxhall, an all-star pitcher who's been all scars most of the season Tuesday threw his weight into the Cincinnati Redlegs' desperate battle for survival in the National League pennant race.

The nominal ace of the Cincinnati staff, Nuxhall had not pitched a complete game and had won only one decision since the All-Star game until he came through Tuesday with a five-hitter that gave the Redlegs a 2-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

The win enabled the Redlegs to pick up a full game on both the Milwaukee Braves and Brooklyn Dodgers.

Of greater importance was the fact that the victory snapped a three-game Cincinnati losing streak and came at a time when the Redleg staff seemed to be buckling under pressure of the tight race.

Nuxhall, a 17-game winner last season and a member of this year's All-Star team despite a 6-9 record at the time, tossed his second shutout and struck out four. Wally Post hit his 22nd homer in the fourth inning.

Cards Whip Braves
The St. Louis Cardinals, battling to retain fourth place, beat the Milwaukee Braves, 6-2, for their seventh win in 13 meetings with the league leaders. Murry Dickson went the distance for his ninth victory.

The Braves, however, retained their two-game lead when the last-place New York Giants whipped the Dodgers, 3-1, on Willie Mays' two-run eighth-inning homer off Clem Labine. Jim Hearn fired a seven-hitter for his fifth win after matching shut-out pitching with Sal Maglie for six innings.

The fast-moving Philadelphia Phillies trounced the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-0 and 11-2, to celebrate Richie Ashburn night. Harvey Haddix and Curt Simmons each pitched a six-hitter for his seventh straight victory. Ashburn delivered two hits in each game.

Mantle Slams 42nd
Mickey Mantle slammed his 42nd homer to remain 13 games ahead of Babe Ruth's record 1927 pace and spark the New York Yankees to a 12-2 drubbing of the Boston Red Sox. Billy Martin drove in four runs in a 15-hit attack.

Wayne Belardi and Ray Boone homered in the 15th inning to lift the Detroit Tigers to a 6-4 verdict over the Cleveland Indians after Cleveland pitchers Early Wynn and Don Mossi retired 28 batters in succession. The Indians got 14 hits and nine walks but left 20 runners stranded.

Jack Harshman pitched a four-hitter and homered and Larry Doby also homered as the Chicago White Sox crushed the Kansas City Athletics, 12-1. Jim Rivera and Harshman each collected three hits to lead the White Sox' 16-blow assault on three Kansas City pitchers.

Connie Johnson struck out 11 batters and pitched a six-hitter to give the Baltimore Orioles a 3-0 win over the Washington Senators. Chuck Stobbs yielded only one earned run but suffered his 10th loss.

Ohio Valley Completes Babe Ruth Meet Field

Luke Sewell Ousted As Rainier Skipper

Seattle —(U.P.)— Luke Sewell, who brought the old St. Louis Browns in by a whisker for their only pennant in 1944, was out today as manager of the second-place Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League after the club slipped out of first place and tallied 12½ games back.

General Manager Dewey Soriano announced the firing, saying "the team just wasn't winning. We felt a change in leadership was necessary."

Soriano said Coach Bill Brennan would run the club the rest of the season.

Sewell became the third manager in the PCL to get the axe in mid-season this year. His club had got off to a good start, taking over first place and holding it early in the campaign.

The Rainiers lost the top spot to the Los Angeles Angels July 11. But with what was generally regarded as the slickest pitching in the loop, the club held on and was still within striking distance of the Angels until recently.
