Coon Favors Joint Work on Farm Plan

John Day — (U.P.) — Rep. Sam Coon (R-Ore.) said yesterday that the Eisenhower farm program was an effort on two fronts to solve a national problem that should not be considered from the standpoint of political gain by either party.

Coon told the John Day Kiwanis club at its luncheon today that the administration is providing for the immediate relief of troubled farmers while at the same time adopting measures for the "long haul."

"The farm problem has been with us since after the last war," Coon said. "It has not been confined to one party. I think the Republicans and Democrats should work together for a permanent solution, not one designed to attract the largest number of farm votes."

Gore Appears Possible Vice President Candidate

Chicago — (U.P.) — Adlai E. Stevenson, front running candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, was reliably reported yesterday to be leaning toward Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) as a possible vice presidential running mate.

Gore's name emerged as a likely vice presidential choice while Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) and Sen. Robert H. Humphreys (D-Minn.) appeared to be sharing the spotlight.

Saugus, Mass. — (U.P.) — The Academy of Studies in Moscow has just bought a year's subscription to The First Iron Works Gazette. That is the official publication of the First Iron Works Association of Saugus, with headquarters here where America's first iron works was established in 1650.

Pontiac, Mich. — (U.P.) — A 90-second tardiness cost the city \$1,700. Only two bids were submitted on revenue bonds to finance off-street parking, but the low bid was ruled void because it was submitted a minute and a half after the deadline.

Stevenson's Son Confident of Victory

Honolulu — (U.P.) — Pfc. Borden Stevenson, 24, said yesterday he is confident his father can win the Democratic presidential nomination on the second ballot.

"I don't think Mr. Truman can dictate to the delegates," young Stevenson said, referring to former President Truman's determination to fight in behalf of Averell Harriman's nomination. Borden said he believes his father has a good chance of defeating Mr. Eisenhower this fall, if the Democrats choose him to be their standard bearer.

He said he believed the primaries taught his father "the importance of getting out and meeting people."
Young Stevenson is an information specialist at Fort Shafter. He is being discharged in two weeks, after which he hopes to travel with his father in the forthcoming campaign.

Tax Collections Reach \$85,171,132

Salem — (U.P.) — A total of \$85,171,132 or 49.9 per cent more than last year was collected by the Oregon State Tax Commission for 1955-56, it was reported Wednesday.

Personal income tax collections amounted to \$68,779,863, a 69.7 per cent rise, and corporation taxes increased 16.9 per cent to \$16,391,269.

The number of returns filed declined from about 580,000 to 564,000 with only personal tax returns showing any gains.

The commission attributed the rise in personal income taxes to higher personal incomes and changes made in rates and exemptions.

Commissioner Ray Smith predicted that in view of current economic conditions, prospects were good for further increases in Oregon tax collections.

Mosquitoes Breeding In Seepage Areas

Areas in the county where sewage has seeped from disposal facilities have been among the principal mosquito breeding places this year, according to the county health department.

Individual treatment of these and other breeding places has helped control the mosquito situation this year, they said. They pointed out there is only one mosquito spraying unit in the county.

Cool nights have slowed down the breeding of mosquitoes, but the problem will remain until mid-September, and fogging equipment will remain in use until that time, they reported.
