San Francisco—Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall on presidential aide Harold Stassen's campaign to dump Vice President Richard M. Coal Freighter Tells Of Fire in Hold

Seattle — (U.P.) — The coal freighter Orizaba reported a fire in its number two hold to the Coast Guard last night. When the ship made its report, it was located about 400 miles west of the Columbia river lightship off Astoria, Ore.

The Coast Guard dispatched the cutter Yocona from Astoria to escort the ship back to port. The Coast Guard said the Orizaba had radioed that it was "in no immediate danger."

The ship, sailing out of Astoria, is a 6000-ton vessel, measuring 396 feet long.

Queen Accused of Violating Sabbath

London — (U.P.) — The Rev. Kenneth McRae, minister in the Scottish Free Church, said today he will refuse to meet touring Queen Elizabeth in Scotland Saturday because she "betrayed the Sabbath."

The minister complained that the Queen received Soviet leaders Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev on the Lord's Day, and that they were "avowed atheists." He also accused the queen of violating "the moral law of God by attending polo matches upon various Sabbath afternoons."

The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, a newspaper editor, a women's page editor and two newspaper writers. These consult with clergymen of all faiths and denominations. All letters are held in complete confidence.

Linda — I would adopt his baby.
Harry — She just wants to punish me.

Linda — My husband has been accused of being the father of a baby born to an unmarried girl. Hurt though I am by this, I do not want scandal. The girl's family threatens to file suit, but I thought it might save the situation if we could adopt the baby as our own and possibly, in addition, make some settlement for the mother.

My husband protests that his unfaithfulness was not entirely his fault and that he has never stopped loving me. But he objects to my solution of the problem and says he would prefer reaching some settlement for the support of the child, even at the risk of having to go into court. I feel that if he really loved me, he would go along with my plan to avoid scandal.

Harry — I have said the matter was not entirely my fault because I was not the aggressor in this situation. The girl tempted me and, while I do not feel that this justifies me, neither do I see why my wife and I should have to raise this girl's child.

If we had to raise this child, I do not feel that we could ever have children of our own in the same home. Frankly, I would not wish it, because I have no respect for the girl's mother and could not feel right about her child. I want a family without this shadow.

Nor can I believe that my wife will ever really forgive me if this child is in our home all the time, to remind her of her grievance.

The Council: If the mother has any character, she will not agree to Linda's bold proposal. In any event, it would be a dangerous experiment for all concerned.

Linda may be a rare person, but it would take the rarest kind of woman to be able to love this child as her own and to overcome her feelings against her husband while the child was present to remind her of his unfaithfulness.

Linda would do well to examine her own feelings probing-ly. We suspect, in view of the great emphasis she placed on the element of scandal, that she is motivated in her proposal by a desire, perhaps not clearly perceived by her, to punish her husband by bringing the child into their home.

While her husband may deserve punishment, unfortunately, she would be punishing herself even more by thus surrendering her whole life to bitterness. If Linda wishes to be happy and to have a happy family of her own, she should accept a more sensible solution.

The child's prospects for a happy life, certainly would be far better elsewhere, as the adopted child of a childless couple that would raise the child without surrounding it with guilt feelings and bitterness.
