## Sewer Assessment Details Worked Out

Details of a proposed sewer assessment method to pay for a sanitary sewer in the Verde Hills area have been worked out by the finance committee of the city council, it was reported this morning by Chairman Jack Fitzgerald.

The fees which individual property owners would pay under each of four proposed methods of assessments, and on a fifth, which combines two of the others and which the committee has decided is the most fair, are shown on a chart which is available for inspection at the reception desk in the city hall, Fitzgerald said.

The committee chairman said the four proposals were (1) assessment on a square foot basis of each piece of property; (2) a flat connection fee, the same for all pieces of property; (3) assessment on a front-foot basis; and (4) assessment on the basis of making the job two separate projects divided by Groveland ave.

The committee, after consideration, settled on a method which combines a flat fee plus square footage assessment, Fitzgerald reported. The proposal will be presented to the city council, he said.
