

NY Homers Too Much for Orioles; Basinski Leads Bevos to 3-2 Win

'Jinx' Halts Mantle In Homer Drive

The "Baltimore jinx" hounded Mickey Mantle again Saturday but teammates Bill Skowron, Billy Martin and Gil McDougald hit home runs to lead the New York Yankees to a 4-1 victory over the Orioles in the first game of a day-night doubleheader.

Mantle, who hasn't hit a homer at Baltimore's sprawling Memorial stadium this season, went hitless against the combined slants of Skinny Brown and George Zuverink. However, his hefty bat wasn't even needed as the Yankees picked up a run in the second inning on singles by Joe Collins and Hank Bauer, plus a neat squeeze bunt by Cleverton Hamers.

Skowron then led off the fourth with his 19th homer. Martin added his in the fifth and McDougald connected in the ninth. Tom Stuchlik, meanwhile, limited the Orioles to six hits and missed a shutout on a second inning homer by Bob Nieman.

The Washington Senators scored two runs in the ninth inning to defeat the Boston Red Sox, 9-7, for the 11th in 15 meetings this season. Ted Williams and Ted Lepcio each hit two homers for the Red Sox but they weren't enough to fight off the Nats, who probably would be battling for the pennant if they played Boston every day.

With the score tied at 7-7 in the ninth Washington loaded the bases on a walk, a single by Jose Valdivielso, a force out and an error by Red Sox pitcher Ike Delock. Herb Plews' infield hit scored Valdivielso with the winning run and a walk to Pete Runnels forced home the second run.

Wynn Gets Victory
Larry Doby's double in the eighth inning knocked in the winning run as the Chicago White Sox edged the Detroit Tigers, 2-1. Bob Keegan allowed only five hits for the White Sox, who now have won 10 of their last 12 games. Paul Foytack was the losing pitcher.

Early Wynn registered his 14th victory of the season as the Cleveland Indians routed the Kansas City Athletics, 8-1. Wynn held the A's to six hits in seven innings. He led the game voluntarily after the seventh because of the excessive heat in Cleveland.

In the only National League day game, Dale Long and Jack Shepard each hit home runs in pacing the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 9-1 triumph over the New York Giants. Bob Friend scattered nine hits in recording his 14th victory against 12 defeats. He lost a shutout in the second inning when Bill White singled, stole second and scored on Foster Castleman's single.

Program Paying Olympic Women

Philadelphia — (U.P.) — There was little doubt Saturday that the AAUS junior Olympic development program is paying dividends in U. S. women's track and field stars.

Backers of the program had only to point to the six meet records and one new American standard established Friday in the National AAU girls' championships here at Franklin field. One of the top prospects is Pamela Kurrell, 17-year-old San Francisco high school student, who staged the greatest one-girl performance in the history of the meet. Her most outstanding feat in a triple-win effort was the 139 feet, one inch toss in the discus, which smashed all American marks. The old standard of 137 feet, 3 1/4 inches was set back in 1932 at Chicago by J. Wajsonwa of Poland.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — Eddie Basinski smashed a two-run homer Saturday to give the Portland Beavers a 3-2 victory over the San Francisco Seals and tumble the Seals into seventh place.

BASEBALL Toronto Man Becomes 2nd to Conquer Strait

Port Angeles, Wash. — (U.P.) — Cliff Lumsden, 25, of Toronto, became the second person to swim the Strait of Juan de Fuca when he came ashore five miles east of here Friday after 11 hours and 35 minutes in the water.

Victoria, B. C. — (U.P.) — Two powerful swimmers, a Victoria chef and a California housewife, Saturday conquered the tide-ripped Strait of Juan de Fuca that separates Canada and Washington.

Mrs. Amy Hiland, Long Beach, swam the 18.3 miles in the 50-degree salt water in 10 hours, 51 minutes and three seconds.

She was the first woman to complete the difficult swim. Mrs. Hiland landed at a point adjacent to Williams Head, about six miles west of Victoria, at 2:36 p.m. PST. She swam from Port Angeles, Wash.

Ben Laughren, Victoria chef, touched Vancouver Island about 35 minutes after the exultant Mrs. Hiland completed her swim. Laughren was in the water 10 hours and 17 minutes, faster than Mrs. Hiland's time and faster than the times for the only two swimmers who crossed the Strait before Saturday.

Laughren landed about 17 miles west of Victoria and apparently did not fight the tides as vigorously as Mrs. Hiland did in an attempt to swim directly to Victoria.

Although one of her arms was raw and bleeding from the buffeting waves in the final miles of her swim, Mrs. Hiland said, "I feel fine. I'm thrilled that I made it, and I'm grateful. I feel just wonderful."

The only two other persons who have conquered the torturous strait are Bert Thomas, Tacoma, Wash., logger, and Cliff Lumsden of Toronto.

Lumsden made his successful swim Friday.

Richardson Tops Aussie

Newport, R. I. — (U.P.) — Ham Richardson, the 22-year-old Yankee who is waging a one-man campaign against Australia's tennis stars, set up a title match with Ken Rosewall Saturday by rallying to defeat Ashley Cooper in the semi-finals of the Newport Casino tournament, 10-12, 6-4, 6-3, 6-3.

Rosewall, the little Aussie Davis cupper, scored a 6-4, 6-2, 12-14, 5-7, 6-0, triumph over teammate Neale Fraser in the other semi-final which lasted three hours.

Doctors at St. John's hospital said Flaherty, a Chicago tavern operator, was "in very critical" condition suffering a skull fracture, possibly jaw fracture, fractures of the right arm and left shoulder and multiple face lacerations.

The 30-year-old, red-haired Flaherty was injured when his car spun on the 28th lap on the oval track and was struck by a car driven by Jack Turner of Seattle, Wash.

Turner was not hurt and his car, which hurled over Flaherty's, was not damaged.

Flaherty's car overturned and he was pinned beneath the wreckage.
