Group Organizes To Assist, Help Mexican Nationals

"Trabajado para los internacionales amistos," the Mexican nationals would say, but in Medford they call it working for international friendship. That is the purpose of Amigos Internacional, a group of people in the community interested in the Mexican nationals.

Amigos Internacional has been meeting weekly since July 5 on Thursday at 8 p.m. in the county courthouse auditorium. Last Thursday evening a work night was held, and those attending, armed with hammers, saws, and other tools, built benches for the barracks grounds where the Mexican laborers live.

"It just grew," said Bill Walker, student minister at the First Methodist church and chairman of the group, when asked about Amigos Internacional.

Program Started — It all started in June when Walker preached on world peace. A member of the congregation, Charles Anderson, was interested. After talking with Walker they decided to bring world peace down to the local level by helping the nationals who harvest the crops in the valley each summer.

At first the Social Action group at the church met to discuss the problem. Then, not wishing to limit the organization to the one church, they changed to a civic group that is open to all interested people in the community. An average of 15 persons have attended the meetings.

Lumber Donated — The lumber used for the six benches made Thursday evening was donated by Elk Lumber company. Tools were either brought by those attending or loaned. The group plans other work nights.

Amigos Internacional has been unsuccessful in locating a place in Medford that could be used as a service center. They hope eventually to have a full time staff, including translators, available throughout the day and evening at a place where the Mexicans may relax and enjoy their native music or find help in routine daily matters.

Estimated 6 Million Board Feet of Timber Sold at Oral Auction

Seven tracts of Douglas fir, white fir and pine timber, totaling an estimated 6 million board feet, were sold at oral auction by the Medford office of the bureau of land management Aug. 16 for \$158,074.65 or an average of \$26.65 for all species.

BLM officials said bids may be submitted for a small tract of salvage timber in southern Douglas county for a period of 90 days. There were no bidders for the tract.

Wind Blown Timber — Five of the seven tracts sold Thursday consisted of timber windthrown by last winter's storm. Much of the damage was in the Dead Indian area east of Ashland.

One tract will involve a careful clean-up of dead or decadent trees from the recreation area adjacent to the east shore of Hyatt Lake, officials stated. Another one includes timber which

must be removed to make way for construction of the Howard Prairie delivery canal by the bureau of reclamation.

Highest bidders in Jackson county were: Fred Starnes, highest of six bidders for 203,000 board feet in the Howard Prairie area, \$36,000 for Douglas fir, \$26 for ponderosa pine and \$20 for white fir; Donald Brace, highest of five bidders for 191,000 board feet in the Howard Prairie area, \$31 for Douglas fir, \$35.20 for ponderosa pine and \$20 for white fir; Everett Cushman, only bidder for 40,000 board feet in the Trail Creek area, \$18.75 for Douglas fir and \$11.25 for white fir.

Klamath County — Highest bidders in Klamath county were Puckett and Scherer, highest of two bidders for \$2,134,000 board feet in the Hyatt Lake area, \$33.50 for Douglas fir, \$40 for ponderosa pine and \$12.85 for white fir; Emery G. Nye, highest of five bidders for 620,000 board feet in the Moon Prairie area, \$35 for Douglas fir, \$32.10 for sugar pine and \$13 for white fir; Puckett and Scherer, only bidder for 2,199,000 board feet in the Howard Prairie Delivery Canal area, \$28.05 for Douglas fir, \$33.05 for ponderosa pine, \$32.95 for sugar pine and \$11 for white fir. In Josephine county only bidder for 547,000 board feet in the Sawmill Gap area was Bates Lumber company, \$24.65 for Douglas fir and \$17.55 for sugar pine.
