## The Medical Roundup

Recently, Dr. Warren E. Wheeler, of Columbus, Ohio, said that the two most important epidemic diseases in new-born infants are impetigo—an infection of the skin—and epidemic diarrhea. Both are caused by certain varieties of common bacteria which are probably flying around everywhere with the dust in the air. In spite of every effort to hold down the number of germs in the infant rooms in hospitals, many infants get into trouble, and epidemics start up which are hard to stop. Sometimes a baby comes down with diarrhea or impetigo soon after reaching home.

Today, the hospital pediatricians can usually stop an outbreak of either disease by giving both the infected child and the other children in the hospital a dose of one of the newer antibiotics. Unfortunately, the old penicillin sometimes fails to do the job.

Multiple Sclerosis  
Many unhappy persons want to know if there is any definite or always dependable treatment

for multiple sclerosis, and I have to say that officers of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society (279 Park ave., Suite 7G, New York, 17) say they know of none. Unfortunately, as yet, no one knows what produces the disease.

In this trouble the lining or insulation that surrounds most of nerves of the body is eaten into here and there, and as a result, some nerves occasionally do not work well. The patient may be in a state of partial blindness with vision or with the strength of certain muscles of the body. Often for a year or more the diagnosis remains in doubt. In such cases the patient will do well to consult a good neurologist who can generally tell what is going on. The important point for a patient to remember is that many of the sufferers from this disease live for many years, and many get by fairly well. Many are able to keep working and earning a living.

Dr. Alvarez hopes his readers will understand that it would be impossible for him to answer requests for information or to attempt to diagnose by mail.

## Navy Planning Atom Powered Carrier

Washington—(UPI)—Construction of the world's first atomic-powered aircraft carrier almost certainly will be proposed to Congress next January, high defense officials said Saturday.

The Navy is confidently preparing to lay its request for the long-heralded warship before Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson this fall.

If design of nuclear reactors for large ships is far enough advanced, officials said, there should be little trouble in getting Wilson's approval to include the carrier in next year's Navy budget.

Mrs. B. R. — I want to make my own way.  
Stanley — I don't want mother to marry again.

Mrs. B. R. — I lost my husband three months ago in an accident. I have two married children and a grown-up son who is still unmarried. All of them have united to persuade me that my son, who refused to live at home while my husband was alive, should now live with me. I do not like the idea.

They argue that I would be lonesome at home alone and have to go out to work in order to fill my time and support myself. This is exactly what I would like to do.

I do not hold it against my son that he preferred to live away from home until now, although I felt that things would have been easier for us financially if our son had lived at home. Now, however, I feel young enough to be able to go out and earn my own living. I used to find it a little irksome at times because I had too little to do at home, but at least I was not then an object of charity or a burden.

Stanley — My mother does not seem to understand. I have really missed living with my parents, but I found it was the best way to keep out of unhappy arguments with my father. I don't want to give her charity. I need her companionship.

If we maintain a home together, we will have a place to which to invite my sisters and their families and we will have a close family circle, something I have always missed. If my mother goes out to work, we will all be lonely and she'll probably wind up marrying a man out of loneliness, and will then have both to take care of him and go out to work.

The Council: Stanley is more the problem in this family than his mother, who seems to have a healthy enough attitude about her future. Stanley should really be taken in hand.

Stanley could not get along with his father and he fears that his mother may marry again. No doubt, that is a possibility, but it is hardly right that Stanley should assume that if his mother married again, she would make a bad match. His emotions have quite evidently been hurt and badly mixed up somewhere along the line.

Mrs. B. R. should not be in the position of rejecting her son but neither should she step into a situation now where Stanley would rule out marriage for himself as well as his mother.

If they are to have a home together, it should be clearly understood that Mrs. B. R. may go out to work. If necessary, they
