Stocks Continue Retreat; Volume Sharply Reduced

New York—(U.P.)—Stocks retreated again today with volume sharply reduced. Losses among leaders generally held to small amounts, but they were enough to erode a bit more from the industrial and utility averages. Firmness in a few issues sustained railroads in their average. The general average fell to a new low since July 3. Late in the day metals met some pressure which forced them down after early gains running to more than a point. Steels also eased. Motors were mixed.

Authorities Hold Two Teen-Agers

Philip Arnold Johnson, 19, Port Orford, Ore., and a 16-year-old Eureka boy, were arrested Tuesday by Medford police and lodged in county jail charged with burglary in a dwelling, according to city police.

The boys were arrested in connection with the burglary of the Salvation Army building, Fourth and Bartlett sts., between 5 p.m. Monday and 8 a.m. Tuesday, police said. Police reported both boys admitted the robbery. The burglary was reported to city police by Bob James Johnston, 1016 Whitman st., manager of the Salvation Army office in Medford. Police said Johnston and Richard Walter McIntosh, also of 1016 Whitman st., discovered the robbery Tuesday morning.

Articles reported stolen were a fingernail file, a chisel, a pocket watch, a ball-point pen, and \$6 in change, police said. Most of the stolen items had been pawned, they said. Entrance was made to the building by forcing a rear window open, according to police.

Johnstone will appear in circuit court Friday. The district attorney's office and Jackson county juvenile authorities are conferring to determine the status of the 16-year-old.

Blizzards Now Not Like Storm of 1717

Semerville, Mass.—(U.P.)—The blizzards that buried the northeast this spring apparently didn't compare with the "Great Snow of 1717."
 Edith A. Ellis of this city recently discovered an ancient newspaper containing a graphic account of that oldtime storm, which began Feb. 20, 1717 and lasted five days.
 The snowfall was described as the greatest in New England history—"almost burying under the frozen mass the small log houses of the new plantations."
 "So efficiently were even the most traveled roads blocked that the magistrates and ministers of Boston (who had come to town on the first day of the storm to attend a funeral) were unable to return for some days... Old Indians, of a 100 years, said that their fathers had never told them of such a snow."
 "It was six feet deep in the streets of Boston, 10 feet deep at Dunstable, 12 feet at Deer-

field, on the Connecticut. At Exeter and Dover, cottages and cabins of one story were entirely buried so that the people dug paths from one house to another under the snow.
 "During the snow a great number of deer came from the woods for food and were followed by wolves, which killed many...
 "The mail from Boston was 10 days in reaching Portsmouth (50 miles away) and seven in returning..."
