Fluoridation Of City Water

I just talking to a scientist connected with a great food industry, who tells me of a violent, abusive and obscene letters he gets from people who, without any evidence or justification accuse his great company of putting traces of fluorine in their packaging foods. We agreed that the more violent the abuse, the less the information possessed by the writer. I receive the same type of nasty letters from antivaccinationists, antivaccinationists and the lover of rapacious cancer quacks. My secretary is happy when she finds in my mail an occasional calm and sensible letter from someone who asks me where he can find a brochure giving the facts for and against fluoridation.

In the field of science, today, a good physician has to know so much, and he has to keep up with so many new advances, that he must be a fast reader, and he must retain easily much of the information that he takes in. Third, most men who go into medicine should like people, and especially nervous and worried and sickly people. The physician should have infinite patience with such persons. Fourth, no one should go into medicine who hasn't good powers of reasoning and good judgment. He will need these faculties many times a day. Fifth, no one should go into medicine who hasn't great sense of honesty which will keep him from "making work," ordering needless operations, and running up bills. Finally, no one should go into the practice of

I was just reading and abstract of a report by the Public Health Service summarizing a 10-year study of the experience of the health authorities and dentists of Grand Rapids, Michigan. They state that in the cases of children born since fluoridation was started, the dental cavity rate for the permanent teeth "was reduced on the average by about 60 per cent."

That the procedure is safe was shown by U. S. Public Health Service men who studied health and death statistics in the cities using fluoridation, and found no increases in the usual rates of illness or death. This should put an end to the wild claims of some persons that fluorine is poisoning people wholesale. It should put an end to the fears of all sensible people.

Might Avoid Excitement

Actually, much of the excitement about fluoridation might have been avoided if health authorities had only pointed out at the start that they were planning in certain cities to add enough fluorine to the water to bring its fluoride content up to the normal amount found in many localities. In some few cities there is even more natural fluorine in the water than is needed. All this produces is a mottled enamel on the teeth of some persons.

What puzzles me is why, when a city pays able experts in public health to keep the people healthy, more of these people do not leave matters of health in the hands of the experts. Why should the people who know nothing about these problems insist on making the decisions in regard to them. Why should they demand to vote upon the issue? I might as well demand a voice in the designing of a new tunnel under the Hudson River.

Should A Lad Plan To Go Into Medicine?

Many young men and women ask me to advise them about the advantages and disadvantages of studying medicine. I can suggest now that they read a book by Harold Coy, called "Doctors and What They Do" (Watts, N. Y.). It tells of the several types of practice now available.

Seventy years ago, when my father was leaving medical school, there was only one thing for him to do and that was to go into general practice. Today a young graduate can choose among several types of work. He can go into general practice, and he can work by himself, or in a clinic, or for a company, or for the armed forces or the Veteran's Administration. He can go into any one of several specialties, or he can work in a laboratory, or he can be a research worker. He can be a teacher in a medical school, or an expert in public health. If he does not like people, or if he hates the thought of waiting perhaps years for a practice, he can go into some field in which he does not have to see patients.

With all this, Coy points out that the physician has a position of honor in the community, and he can have the great satisfaction of knowing that he can do much good to his fellow men. Important points that I would emphasize are, first, that no one should go into medicine unless he (or she) wanted to very much, and feels a certain dedication or calling to the work. Second, no one should go into medicine who is not a good student, especially

medicine who is not willing gladly to do much of his work for nothing or for much less than his time is worth. Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (UP) — In the early day of movies, two reelers gave way to features, silent films to sound and black-and-white to color. The still-growing television industry is looking for ways to add to its stature.

Following the course set by motion pictures rather than by radio, TV is being directed more and more toward big epics, musicals and Broadway plans. NBC has taken the lead in this trend. Instead of slipping into the comfortable pattern of radio, the network is staking a flier into offbeat programming. Wide World This is what you may expect to see on your TV set within

Bean Stalk; documentary treatments by "Project 20" of World War I. The jazz era of the '20s and the depression years of the '30s, and "Telescope," a Sunday afternoon series on current history.

Pat Weaver, NBC board chairman, predicts this "event type of programming" is the next big step for television. He bases this belief on the "Spectacular" treatment carried out by NBC during the past two seasons. These 90-minute and two-hour colorcasts ranged from "Peter Pan" to shows which were reviewed less favorably by the critics.

But the hits outweighed the misses and prompted the network to go ahead with bigger shows which a few years ago could have been considered only by major motion picture studios. Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd made five visits to Antarctica between 1928 and 1956. However, scarcely more than half of the continent's 6,000,000 square miles has yet been seen by man.
