Portland — (UPI) — Manager Bill Sweeney and his Portland Beavers stopped here briefly yesterday en route to Vancouver, B. C., for a series with the Mounties. The Beavers were idle yesterday.

Sweeney will send Rene Valdez after his 19th victory against the Vancouver club tonight.

"Boot one on the Sacramento Solons and they'll murder you." That's the word around the Pacific Coast league this year, in contrast to the last six when the Solons were the loop's prime patsies. Since 1950, they've finished seventh twice and dead last four times.

But the Solons, making a determined run for the first division, proved again Thursday night they'll win on opportunism if they get a little break. Two San Francisco errors set up six unearned runs and the Solons trampled the Seals 7-4.

In the only other action, Hollywood and San Diego split a doubleheader, San Diego winning the first game 7-4, and the Stars taking the second 4-3 in a game halted because of a heavy fog after seven innings.

Tommy Heath's Solons were only a game behind fourth-place Portland after Thursday night's win.

Costly Errors
They scored four runs in the fourth with an error by Seal second sacker Ken Aspromonte setting up the fireworks. The boot, two walks, a double by George Risley and a two-run single by Tom Agosta produced the runs.

A throwing error by Frank Malzone at third set up two more in the eighth with Joe Koppe's two-run double the big smash.

Knuckleballer Earl Harrist, 35 years and three days old, got the win. The Seals socked him for nine hits including a solo homer by Eddie Sadowski and a two-run circuit sock by Aspromonte.

Early Morning Drills Slated by Coach Royal for Husky Gridders

Seattle — If the early bird really gets the worm, the University of Washington could win plenty of football victories this fall.

For Husky gridders will be out of bed "with the birds" every morning in September.

Coach Darrell Royal, in an innovation to northwest football, plans 6:30 a.m. workouts for his squad each day beginning Sept. 1. Breakfast will follow the early practice session.

A second workout will be held late each afternoon, tentatively planned at 4 o'clock.

"Advantages of the early morning practice hour are threefold," Royal explained. "In the first place, the daily sessions will be far enough apart to enable the squad to go full speed at both practices."

"Also, the boys will be working without the handicap of an undigested breakfast under their belts. And the early hour will avoid the midday heat, a factor which will be important if the present weather continues."

Diet for Kidney Disease Patients May Be Wrong

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The medical practice of keeping many kidney disease patients on a low-protein diet may be ill-advised, according to research being done by a University of California medical professor at Los Angeles.

Dr. Nathaniel B. Kurnick has shown that when one kidney is removed from a patient the other one grows and increases its functioning to compensate for the loss of the other.

He found that a low-protein diet in such cases does spare kidney function but does not provide enough protein for the necessary expansion of the kidney.
