### Specialist Advises On Storage of Bread

For flavor down to the last slice, keep bread wrapped tightly during storage, recommend Oregon State college food marketing specialists.

Best way to keep bread fresh is to put it in a cool, ventilated container or in a freezer. Refrigerator storage isn't recommended because cold sets up a stale flavor.

Bread stays fresh in its original package for a few days but for longer storage it needs to be put in a moisture-proof wrapper and sealed. Partly-used loaves keep better this way, too, the specialists add.
