Cabbage and avocados are on the market now, and these two combine well to make an attractive and interesting salad. For avocado-cabbage slaw use 3 cups shredded cabbage, 2 tablespoons sliced green sweet pepper, 2 tablespoons sliced pimiento, 1/2 cup commercial sour cream, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, cayenne pepper, 1 avocado, salad greens and tomato wedges. Combine cabbage, green pepper and pimiento. Blend sour cream, vinegar, salt, sugar and a dash cayenne. Blend lightly with cabbage mixture, and chill. Just before serving cut avocado into halves and remove seed and skin. Dice fruit over cabbage, sprinkle lightly with salt and mix together, lightly. Serve on salad greens garnished with slices of avocado and tomato wedge. Makes 5 or 6 servings.

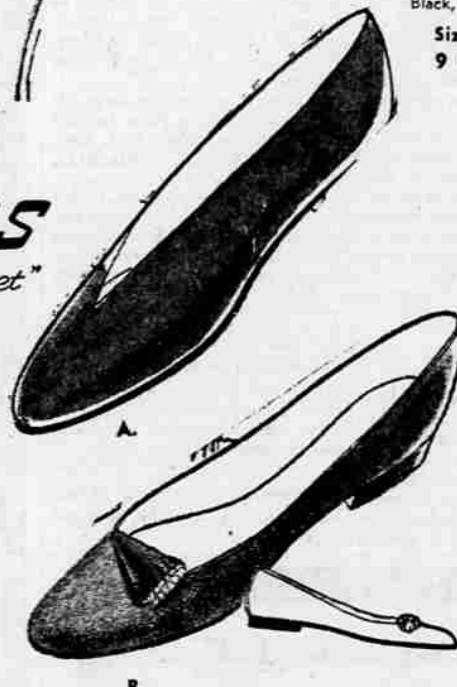
