

Livestock Auction Sales Total Nearly \$30,000 at Fair

The annual livestock auction at the 4-H and Future Farmers of America fair at the fairgrounds Friday night brought a total of nearly \$30,000 to the young sellers, according to the report of fair officials.

A total of 60,925 pounds of beef was sold for \$21,721.55, or an average price of 35.7 cents per pound. Animals sold averaged 923 pounds.

The swine sale totaled \$5,020.17 for animals weighing a total of 20,105 pounds, averaging 180 pounds each. Average price per pound was 25 cents.

The sheep sale brought in \$2,366 for animals averaging 93 pounds, sold at an average price of 32.7 cents per pound. Total weight was 7,535 pounds.

Coffee Salesman Admits Slaying School Teacher

Yonkers, N. Y. — (U.P.) — A slightly-built door-to-door coffee salesman confessed Saturday he killed a parochial school teacher two months ago when she asked him to leave his wife and child. He led police to the girl's shallow grave in a wooded section near a cemetery.

Edward Eckwerth, 29, who was brought here from Portland, Ore., for questioning, broke down at police headquarters and admitted he fatally struck Rosemary Spezzo, 24, last June 22, several months after he struck up a friendship with her while selling her coffee.

He said he struck her on the head with a large stone after having intimate relations with her.

Miss Spezzo's stunned parents, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Spezzo, said they knew nothing of the relationship between their daughter and Eckwerth other than that they chatted through the doorway "when he came to sell coffee."

Knew Daughter Was Dead

"I knew all along my daughter was dead," Mrs. Spezzo said. "I felt it. If she had run off, she would have called or written and would have remembered her pop's birthday in July."

Miss Spezzo's fully-clad, badly decomposed body was found in a slight hollow opposite Mount Hope cemetery in nearby Hastings-on-Hudson, N. Y. Police said Eckwerth told them he hit her on the head several times and then left her unconscious and dying.

Eckwerth, married and the father of a two-year-old daughter, was found in Oregon after abandoning his coffee truck in nearby Mt. Vernon, N. Y.

He was arrested in Portland on an auto theft charge and then was questioned about Miss Spezzo at the request of Yonkers authorities. Under questioning in Portland, he insisted he knew nothing of her disappearance. He stuck to that story after he was brought here last Wednesday, but finally broke down Saturday.

Suspect Held in Chicago Slayings

Oakland, Calif. — (U.P.) — Three Chicago policemen were en route here today to question an ex-convict who was described as "the hottest suspect yet" in the slaying of three Chicago school-boys last October.

The FBI arrested 42-year-old Norvel Degrove Friday in a San Leandro used car lot on charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for three midwest sex crimes.

The FBI said Degrove had also been the subject of a widespread search for questioning in the slaying of Robert Peterson, 13, John Schessler, 13, and his brother, Anton, 11. The boys' nude bodies were found sprawled in a ditch in a Chicago forest preserve.

Degrove had been working in a nursery here, a fact which the FBI said checked out with one of the major clues in the Chicago murders. Traces of chloraldehyde, an insecticide used by gardeners, were found in the scalp of the Peterson boy. The FBI said Degrove had also worked as a nurseryman in Chicago.

SE Portland Area Flooded by Rainfall

Portland, Ore. — (U.P.) — A 12-block area in southeast Portland was flooded Saturday when a collapsed-trunk sewer could not handle the heavy rain that pelted the city.

More than an inch of rain had fallen by late afternoon from the sudden rain storm that started early Saturday morning.

The water extended from curb to curb, filling scores of basements in the area between SE 17th and 14th, from Clinton st. to the Southern Pacific railroad tracks. Some parked cars were stranded in the streets and the only way residents could leave their homes was by wading through the muddy water.

City Commissioner William A. Bows rounded up 200 city workers and all the pumps available to help pump out basements. He said the sewer had collapsed last week and workmen have been working to repair it.

Thornton Said Using Office for Own Gain

McMinnville, Ore. — (U.P.) — State Sen. Carl Francis, Republican candidate for attorney general, Saturday told a group of McMinnville businessmen "that his opponent, Robert Y. Thornton, has used his position as a political instrument for personal gain."

"Thornton," Francis said, "has been severely criticized by newspapers throughout the state for his repeated attempt to get thousands of columns of free publicity so that every voter in Oregon would know him."

Francis charged that Thornton's career as attorney general has been one of "complete inefficiency, lack of ability and of contradictory rulings."

He stated that it is his responsibility as a candidate for attorney general to tell the people of Oregon about the misconduct of Thornton's administration.

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — A two-month-old boy was in critical condition Saturday with a chest stab wound his father was accused of inflicting while under the influence of narcotics.

"I went to the crib and found the scissors sticking out of the baby's chest," she said.

Officers said Gallardo admitted taking a "fix" of heroin before the stabbing.

"I can't explain why I stabbed the baby," officers quoted him as saying. "I picked up the scissors and stuck the point of them on the baby's chest and pushed down."
