Squaw Valley Lodge Destroyed by Fire

Squaw Valley, Calif.—(U.P.)—Luxurious Squaw Valley Lodge in the High Sierra was destroyed by fire Wednesday, but a spokesman said the loss would have "not the slightest effect" upon plans to stage the 1960 winter Olympics in the steep valley.

Alex Cushing, president of the Squaw Valley Corporation, estimated the loss at \$300,000. However, he said, "we'll start rebuilding within 48 hours and we'll be open for the winter ski season on Nov. 23 as planned."

The fire broke out at 5 p. m. (EDT) but there were no reported deaths or injuries, although an estimated 75 to 100 persons were in the rambling, three-story lodge—by far the fanciest in the High Sierra ski country.

The blaze broke out on the third floor, apparently in a kitchen flue. Within minutes, the rustic frame structure was engulfed in flames. It was destroyed in less than an hour.

Baby Mishandling Complaints Received

New Haven, Conn.—(U.P.)—Police said today they have received 15 "informal" complaints of baby mishandling against a hefty pediatric nurse held in the deaths of three infants.

Some parents said their children had been bruised, and cut while in the care of Virginia B. Jaspers, 33, who is six feet tall and weighs 250 pounds. One father said the nurse fed his child whisky. None of the new complaints concerned a death.

One complaint, Marvin Schaefer, 29, of Woodbridge, said he told his pediatrician about Miss Jaspers' behavior in February, 1955. The pediatrician complained to police, said Schaefer, "but they did nothing about it."

Miss Jaspers has admitted breaking the leg of the Schaefer infant by shaking the child violently, police said. However, they added they received no complaint from the parents or the doctor.

Hiroshima Opens First Atom Radiation Hospital

Hiroshima, Japan—(U.P.)—The world's first atom-bomb hospital will open the world's first atomic radiation hospital here Saturday.

The 120-bed hospital has been completed in the compound of the Red Cross Hospital, where most of Hiroshima's A-bomb victims have been treated during the past 11 years.

Wall Street Chilled By Suez Development

New York—(U.P.)—Suez developments chilled Wall Street today and sent stocks down in their worst fall since President Eisenhower suffered an attack of ileitis June 8.

The brunt of the selling came at midsession when prices were driven down one to more than four points. At that time the day's loss in market value ran to more than \$2 billion and brought the week's decline to \$5 billion. Last week the market lost 3 billion.

Trading picked up on the decline which was the most severe in the Middle East oils, the metals, steels, chemicals, and special issues.
