Back Stairs: Ike and Political Shooting

Washington — (U.P.) — Backstairs at the White House: President Eisenhower moved up his plans to return here from the West Coast partly because the political shooting started early this season.

The change in the travel plans were relatively minor and involved no more than 24 to 36 hours. It coincided, however, with news stories reporting tough political speeches highly critical of the administration by Mr. Eisenhower's Democratic opponents.

It seemed strange to some of the Republicans who greeted Mr.

Eisenhower at the Washington Airport Tuesday night that he would not say a few words to the gathering of 500 to 1,000 enthusiastic supporters. There were microphones set up and waiting for him, but Mr. Eisenhower did not speak even when implored to say something for the news-reel cameras. The President shook hands with about 50 or 75 persons, then climbed into his car and with a broad smile and friendly wave to the crowd, he was driven away.

Mr. Eisenhower's silence at the airport apparently stemmed from the fact that he did not regard the setting as appropriate for a political speech.

Former President Truman's let some old Washington friends know that he is furious about a published report that he plans to go to Australia in September, thus avoiding most of the election campaign. He says he has no intention of "running out" and, furthermore, intends to open a series of fighting attacks on the Republicans in the Middle West this week. Mr. Truman thinks the Australian trip story may have started because a friend of his reserved space for the Trumans to attend the Olympics in November, but the former President has decided not to go.
