### Former Dean Gives Coeds Clothes Tips

Washington—(UPI)—Marguerite Shaw, who quit her job as

associate dean of students at American University to become an actress, has stepped back into the role of student adviser to tell coeds "what to wear when."

Miss Shaw gave up student advising on a full time basis 18 months ago when she joined the road company of "The Panama Game." But she told women students during a recent visit here to "strike a happy medium" in choosing clothes.

"I believe in being comfortable, but not sloppy," the former dean said. "I've been surprised to see how students dress when they come to the theater—they wear everything from raincoats to fur stoles."

"Some look like they are going to church, and others dress as though it was a sports event."

"It's best to strike a happy medium," she said. "Select an outfit which is neither overdressed or underdressed for the occasion."

**They Dress for Men**

Miss Shaw said she has learned a lot about co-ed fashions since she joined the road company. In her cross-country swing she visited some 30 college campuses.

She said girls at co-educational schools are "better dressed and groomed" than those at women's colleges.

"It's the same old story," she said, "girls dress for the men."

She said girls should dress for the type of work they are going to do—"Don't wear the same thing to a chemistry lab you would to an English class."

Women students also were advised: that camel's hair chaperons or checked and plaid coachmen coats are the best campus cold-weather buys; sheer blouses and low, tight sheaths for formal wear are "out of place" in college; a good suit is a week-end necessity; and skirts and sweaters or plain wool dresses are best for the classroom.

"Polio Vaccine News Report," a 16 mm motion picture film on medical science's new weapon in the battle against paralytic polio, is now available for free short-term loan from the Oregon State Board of Health.

The 13½ minute film takes the viewer on a trip through the Eli Lilly company laboratories in Indianapolis, showing how Salk vaccine is made and tested for purity and safety. The picture was originally made for television use and has been extremely popular with audiences throughout the United States.

Because only one print of the film is available for general distribution in Oregon, the state board of health has asked that
