Oil Test Holes Being Drilled in Multnomah
Portland — (U.P.) — An official of the Sunray Mid-Continent Oil Company has reported that the firm is having test holes drilled in northwestern Multnomah county to seek geological information.

However, Robert Maynard, company geologist, said the drilling should not be interpreted as testing for oil and gas accumulations.

Transmission Tower Fall Kills Worker
Oregon City — (U.P.) — Richard Cleon Irving, 24, of Cascade Locks, was killed Friday afternoon when a transmission line he was working gave way beneath him. The accident happened two miles south of Redland, Ore.

Another workman, Glen Oscar Daline, of Portland, is in critical condition at Oregon City hospital with compound fractures of both legs, an injured arm and shock.

Irving was crushed under the steel framework of the 100-foot transmission tower, which was being dismantled. According to the office of Leslie Peake, Clackamas county coroner, both men were on the tower when it collapsed. Irving was about 70 feet up on Daline, about 35 feet up on the tower. Daline was thrown free.

The men were employed by Parker - Schram Construction company, which is building a transmission line for the Bonneville Power Administration.

Winds Do Damage to Crops

Table Rock — The thunderstorm that broke here last week was accompanied by winds of almost tornado velocity, and although cutting through a rather narrow strip about one-quarter mile wide, did much damage to corn, buildings and trees, but luckily missed the big pear orchards, which escaped with practically no damage to fruit or trees.

A field of windrowed hay on the Richardson farm was rolled up against the fence like so much tumbleweed, and some of the hay was scattered on a nearby potato patch. Also in the storm's path was our redwood silo that had withstood the elements for some 40 years, but was laid low with one blast. The steel eye bolts in the cement that held the anchor cables were snapped off like icicles.

The storm kept on its north-west course, crossing through the center of the Sams Valley district, where it tore the roof off a granary on the Schulz farm, and scalped a hay barn on the Herbert farm of its metal roof, leaving it hanging on power lines along the highway.

The pear orchards again were spared in this district.

Williamson lived in Medford in the early 1940's. He is the brother of Mrs. William (Louise) Isaacs, route 2, box 605, Central Point.

The Navy did not disclose the number of planes ordered.

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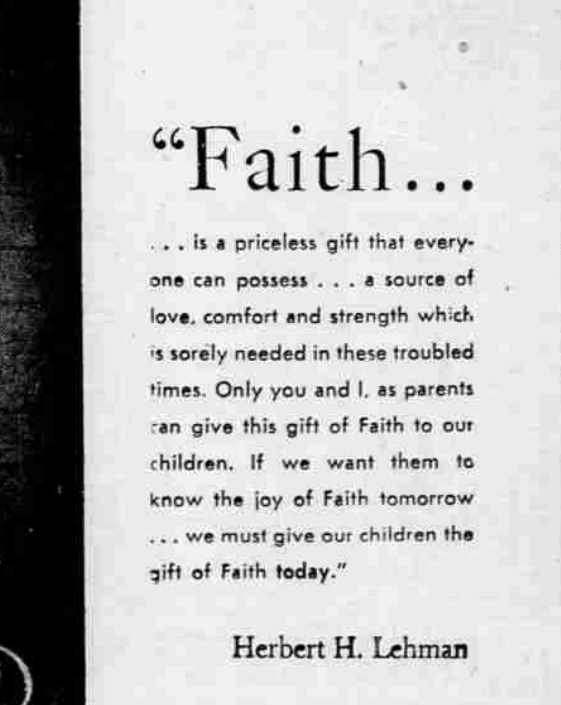
