Garden Clubs Plan Session In Arizona

Headquarters will be at the Hotel Westward Ho, with Mrs. M. H. Starkweather of Tucson, regional director, in charge. Assisting her will be Mrs. T. M. Elliott, also of Tucson and president of the Arizona federation.

Convention chairman, Mrs. Lou Aldrich, Phoenix, has planned a full calendar of events for the visiting gardeners. Major speakers for the three-day meeting will be Senator Barry Goldwater, (R-Ariz.), Mrs. Jack Westcott, Tucson; Dr. Daniel O. Robinson, chairman of the Division of Agriculture, Arizona State college at Tempe; Steve Fazio, assistant professor of horticulture, University of Arizona, Tucson; and Dr. Aaron Cantor, chief clinical psychologist, Veterans' hospital, Phoenix.

Conservation problems, junior gardening, landscape design, flower show procedures, litterbug campaign, and garden therapy will be the main considerations during the meetings. A Hopi Indian theme will be carried throughout the program. A flower show, a fashion show and a tour of the Valley of the Sun, including unique Scottsdale, are planned to entertain the visitors. Hopi Indians in colorful costumes will conclude the convention with their dances.

A September 15 deadline for pre-registration has been set to facilitate handling of the convention. Garden club members wishing to take advantage of a lower registration fee, and a package fee which includes all convention costs, must send their fees to Mrs. Fred Steele, 53 West Encanto Blvd., Phoenix, before Sept. 15.

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Around Hollywood

Hollywood — (U.P.) — They did not laugh when I stepped in front of the movie cameras a few weeks ago to start my role in "Fire Down Below" and neither did I. I was too scared.

Imagine: After making between 80 and 90 pictures in my life, I was suffering my first real case of stage fright. I'd simply been away from the cameras too long. It seemed like a new business, as if I were starting out all over again.

And until that first scene was

completed and in the can, I was as nervous as a kitten.

Trinidad Lovely

We were down in Trinidad at the time. It's lovely there, and we were shooting on location. We made about half the picture on nearby Tobago, which was like an unspoiled paradise.

Now we're back in the studio shooting interiors.

In some respects, the selection of Trinidad for location was as ideal for me as it was for the story. People there are wonderful as a good refresher course in being a movie star.

Everywhere I went I was followed by crowds of fans. I could not shop or go swimming or do anything because they never let me alone. But they were so sincere and intense that it was wonderful. I got writer's cramp three times a day, and I loved it.

Eager Fans

I wasn't the only one singled out for attention. Bob Mitchell and Jack Lemmon, who are in the picture with me, had the same experience. Even when we were shooting six miles out to sea in the Gulf of Paria, off the Port of Spain, a passing fisherman sailed over to get their autographs.

Considering that I've been in the business nearly 20 years, this may sound pretty silly. But I had actually forgotten how eager and demanding fans could be.

If all this sounds like I've been away from the cameras for 100 years, I'm sorry. Actually it's been less than three. But during that time I've had my mind on other things.

Now, with my own personal problems straightened out and my studio contract finally settled, I can concentrate again on my career.

After "Fire Down Below" I'm going to do "Pal Joey," with Frank Sinatra and Kim Novak for Columbia. Then I'd like to do a comedy for a change.

Then who knows? Anybody got any suggestions?
