

### Municipal Courts May Take State Cases

Salem — (UP) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton advised Gov. Elmo Smith today that the Portland Municipal Court has authority to try cases involving violations of state law.

Thornton said the Municipal Court was a legally constituted court even though its judges were appointed rather than elected.

In another opinion, Thornton held that slogans setting out qualifications of judicial candidates may not be printed on the non-partisan judiciary ballot at general elections.

The attorney general also held that the board of directors of a first class school district may lease school facilities for occupation by their school children without securing approval of the district voters. He said a vote was required in second and third class districts.

### Ike Says Influence Won't Diminish

Washington — (UP) — President Eisenhower Wednesday rejected the idea that his influence will diminish if he is elected to a second term.

He told a news conference that "any president, as long as he is honestly and earnestly trying to serve 168 million people, is not going to be without influence."

Mr. Eisenhower is the first president to be affected by a new constitutional amendment limiting an American chief executive to two terms.

### Backstairs: Hagerty Uses 'Democratic'

Washington — (UP) — Backstairs at the White House: Let the strategists at the Republican National Committee do all the planning they want to, but White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty still calls it the "Democratic" party.

The GOP committee planners decided last week that henceforth the opposition would be referred to by the Republican faithful only as the "Democrat" party. Mr. Eisenhower at his news conference last week didn't seem to care much one way or the other what the Republicans called the Democrats.

Hagerty's independence of the National Committee's decree

possibly indicates what the White House thought of the idea in the first place. Or Jim's continued reference to the "Democratic" party may mean simply that he finds it difficult to change his habits of many years in the service of the GOP when "Democratic" was a perfectly acceptable label for "those other people."

Hagerty's use of "Democratic" Party also might have a quite serious underlying reason. The Eisenhower forces in 1952 made substantial progress in luring thousands of so-called independent Democrats into their fold and they're trying to do the same thing again this year.

The White House might not want to offend possible adherents from the other side merely on a matter of semantics.

As Mr. Eisenhower said, "If they want to be known as the Democratic party, it's all right with me."

The White House press room is still talking about the "solid gold Cadillac" used by some of the reporters when Mr. Eisenhower recently visited California's Monterey Peninsula. The newsmen got the car, a golden-hued Cadillac station wagon, from J. Arch Butts Jr., of Monterey.
