

Medford Students Prepare To Return to Classes Soon

All elementary and junior high schools of the Medford public schools open on Monday, Sept. 10. Medford Senior High School opens Monday, Sept. 17. Bus schedules for students affected will be announced later.

Junior High Schools
Junior high schools start at 8:30 a.m. each day and classes close at 3:15 p.m., when the activity period of 45 minutes begins. Students will spend 1½ hours in their first class period in a homeroom period for orientation, guidance, and general announcements.

Two additional one-hour periods round out the morning, followed by noon recess and three class periods in the afternoon.

Except in laboratory-type classes, the last half of each regular class period will be devoted to supervised study under the teacher's direction. There will be no study hall periods as such. Entire classes will be periodically scheduled for the library and students individually will have access to library facilities during out of class hours. The activity period of 45 minutes will enable interested students to take additional instruction in classes not individually scheduled during the regular six period day. Such activities will include band, orchestra, vocal music, intramural athletics, woodshop, homemaking and others.

Both Hedrick and McLoughlin Junior High schools will

have a full day's program the first day. The cafeteria of both schools will be in operation the first day for serving hot lunches. Students bringing sack lunches can obtain milk at the cafeteria. School will be dismissed at approximately 3:15 p.m. on opening day.

Elementary Schools
Elementary schools will open at 8:30 a.m. Monday, when children and parents will be directed to registration rooms. Following registration and securing of books, students at Jackson, Jefferson, Lincoln, Roosevelt and Washington schools will be dismissed until 1 p.m. At that time children will be placed in own homerooms and arrangements made for a regular full day of school on Tuesday.

The cafeteria will not operate at these schools on the opening day. Children transported by school bus can bring sack lunches and remain at school. Milk can be obtained at these schools. Working parents with difficulty in caring for children during the period from initial registration to 1 p.m. can also send children with sack lunches. The cafeteria at Oak Grove and West Side schools will operate on Monday in serving hot lunches. Smaller enrollments at these schools preclude the necessity of an adjustment period from initial registration to 1 p.m.

All elementary schools will dismiss between 2 and 2:30 p.m. **Boundaries Listed**
Boundaries in the district are as follows:

Jackson school—All territory north of the center line of West Main st. and from the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks west to the Oak Grove school boundary.

Jefferson school—That part of the school district south of the center line of West Main st. from the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks to and including both sides of South Oakdale st. and Kings Highway. In addition, students living on Queens Drive,

Marshall, Garfield, Diamond and Agate streets, which are west of Kings highway, on South Peach st. below the South Peach st.-Marshall ave. intersection, and on Charlotte Anne and Barnett roads will attend Jefferson school.

Lincoln school—That area between Bear Creek and the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks excluding small area east of South Riverside ave. and south of East 12th st. whose student residents may attend Roosevelt school if more convenient.

Roosevelt school—All territory in the school district east of Bear Creek, plus the area which is immediately east of the South Riverside ave. and south of East 12th st. Grades one through fourth will attend Roosevelt school, whereas grades five and six will attend at the Roosevelt annex of the Hedrick Junior High school. Students from the Dewey area attend Roosevelt school and Hedrick Junior High school.

Washington school—All territory west of South Oakdale st. to Cherry Lane and Orchard Home rd. between the center line of West Main st. and the center line of Stewart ave. and all territory south of Stewart ave. and west of Kings highway, including Marshall, Garfield, Diamond and Agate streets.

McLoughlin Junior High—That area of Medford school district 549C west of Bear Creek from the north boundary of the district south to Fourth st. and that area west of the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks from Fourth st. south to the school district boundary.

Ninth grade students of the non-high school district 2 (Griffin Creek) and 100 (Howard), and students from West Side and Oak Grove school areas attend McLoughlin Junior High school.

Hedrick Junior High—That area of this school district east of Bear Creek. In addition that area between Bear Creek and the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks from Fourth st. south to the school district boundary. Seventh, eighth, and ninth graders will attend Hedrick Junior High school. Also, non-high school ninth graders from school district 10 (Lone Pine) will enroll here.

Medford Senior High—This school serves the entire school district in grades 10 through 12.

Kenwood area—(a.) fourth, fifth and sixth graders attend Lincoln school, plus any first, second and third graders from the same families with the exception of fourth graders who attended Jefferson school last year in third grade and will continue at Jefferson school. (b.) All other first, second, and third graders will attend Jefferson school plus fourth grade students who attended Jefferson school in the last school year. (c.) All seventh, eighth, and ninth graders will attend the Hedrick Junior High school.

Oak Grove and West Side—The Oak Grove and West Side

school areas will have the same boundaries as last year.

Labor Day Parade Draws Big Crowd at Cave Junction

Cave Junction—An estimated 3000 people lined Cave Junction's quarter-mile Main st. Monday to view a colorful Labor Day parade.

Parade entries this year varied from a two dollar heifer calf and toy wagon to \$30,000 logging rigs loaded with Douglas fir four feet in diameter. Decorated floats, plugging political candidates, local churches and square dance clubs, moved between groups of juvenile clowns and commercialized business entries. The valley's recently acquired fire equipment, together with some older fire trucks, was paraded in mass.

Soldiers March
Former soldiers of various service organizations marched in full-dress uniforms. Veterans of World War I traveled in an old truck bearing a placard, "Veterans of World One, The Nation's Forgotten Men." Loggers, buckers and climbers had their day as gasoline-powered hand saws, raising like giant horns, sliced blocks from a 30-inch log in 30 seconds. High-climbers scaled to the top of a 76 foot spar and returned to earth in 25 seconds.

Use of Park Roads By Trucks Changed

A new rule regulating use of trucks on roads in Crater Lake National park became effective Aug. 14. The ruling provides for permits and fees for trucks of various sizes making use of park roads.

Park Superintendent Tom Williams explained that previously commercial trucking on park roads has been prohibited because the roads were designed for park visitor traffic only and were not constructed to withstand heavy truck traffic.

Trucks in any numbers during the height of the travel season would be a hazard, and heavy loads during certain seasons of the year when frost is coming out of the ground, would damage the roads excessively, he said.

Williams stated the new rule provides that the superintendent may issue permits, for the prescribed fees ranging from \$1 to \$10, if, in his judgment, traffic, weather and road conditions are suitable for truck use.

Permits for taking trucks over park roads must be obtained in advance, Williams added. Permits on be secured at park headquarters or at the park offices in the Post Office building, Medford.
