

Government To Buy Surplus Turkeys, Hamburger in Fall

Washington — (U.P.) — The Agriculture Department today announced it will buy surplus turkeys and hamburger beef to bolster market prices this fall.

The department also said it will buy eggs in the open market if this seems necessary to stabilize prices.

It said it will buy about 50 million pounds of boneless hamburger beef to help cattle producers, especially those marketing cattle fattened on grass.

Officials said no limit for the turkey purchase program had been announced yet. They pointed out that the 1935 turkey crop is a record high, estimated at about 16 per cent above the 1934 crop.

The turkey, hamburger and eggs, if any eggs are purchased, will be distributed to school lunches and other eligible non-profit institutions.

Purchases will be made with so-called Section 32 funds. These are specially designed tariff funds used to take surplus perishable farm products off normal commercial markets.

The purchase programs are expected to be similar to the pork purchase program used last fall in an attempt to bolster live hog prices. A few weeks after the pork purchase program was started, live hog prices hit a 14-year low.

The department said further details of the turkey purchase plan will be announced within a few days. The government will buy frozen, ready to cook turkeys weighing from 8 to 24 pounds.

Beef purchased in the hamburger program, the department said, will be taken from animals graded U.S. commercial or U.S. utility. These low grades come largely from cows which are expected to be sold during the fall months.

Final Phases of Pact Drafted at Klamath

Klamath Falls — (U.P.) — Final language in the proposed Klamath river compact was drafted here yesterday by members of the Oregon and California Klamath River commission. Officials predicted the compact would be signed early in October.

Bert A. Phillips, Douglas City, Calif., said aims of the compact were to "facilitate and promote orderly integrated and comprehensive development of use, conservation and control of land and water resources in the Klamath river basin."

After final language of the compact is written, it will be signed by the commission, and presented to legislatures of Oregon and California in the January sessions. It must be approved by Congress and signed by the president before it becomes law.

McKay Speaks to Pacific City Group

Pacific City — Social security benefits should guarantee a minimum monthly payment of \$50 for persons 72 years of age and older, Doug McKay said here.

Speaking before a non-partisan meeting in the community hall, the Republican candidate for U.S. senator said men and women 72 years or older who are not now receiving benefits from liberalized payments provided by amendments to the social security law in the last four years, should be accorded a

minimum monthly payment of \$50.

"The present minimum of \$30 is both unrealistic and inequitable," McKay said.

"Simple justice demands amendment to the law to remove this inequity," McKay said.

McKay's appearance at Pacific City was his first of a series in Tillamook county during the day. He also visited Diamond Lumber company in Tillamook, the Oregon-Washington Plywood company in Garibaldi, the Lewis Shingle mill in Wheeler and other industrial plants.
