

Portland Symphony Slates 12 Concerts

Portland—The Portland Symphony orchestra season has been enlarged to 12 concerts this year to be performed in the civic auditorium on 11 Monday nights and one Wednesday night.

Besides three orchestral concerts under direction of Theodore Bloomfield, eight artists and the Portland Symphonic choir will appear with the orchestra during the season.

Soprano to Perform
Birgit Nilsson, Swedish soprano, making her first American tour, will appear here for the first time in October after her San Francisco opera performance in "Die Walkure." She will sing arias from Beethoven's "Fidelio" as well as sev-

eral Wagnerian arias.

In mid-November Rudolf Firkušny, pianist, returns after a year making Capitol recordings. He will join the orchestra in the Beethoven "Concerto No. 3." Later in the same month Cellist Leonard Rose will appear with the symphony in the Dvorak "Cello Concerto," marking the first performance of this work by the Portland Symphony orchestra in many years.

Others Scheduled
Brunetta Mazzolini, Portland soprano, will perform the Mozart "Exsultate Jubilate" and the Mahler "Symphony No. 4" with the orchestra in January. Later in the month Henryk Szeryng, Dutch violinist, will

make his American debut with the Portland Symphony performing the Brahms "Concerto for Violin in D Major."

February marks the performance of Cesare Siepi, bass baritone of the Metropolitan, who will sing arias from Mozart, Verdi and Boito. The Schumann "Concerto in A Minor" will be the chief work performed on February 25 when Jacob Lateiner, pianist, will appear.

Arthur Rubinstein performs the Brahms "Concerto No. 2 in B Flat Major" on Wednesday evening, March 27. And, on April 8, 1957, the final symphony concert will be the presentation of the Bach "B Minor Mass"

with the Portland Symphonic choir and four soloists.

Season tickets are on sale at the symphony office in the Park building, 729 S. W. Alder. The phone number for reservations and information is CAPitol 8-1353.

Bedford, Ind.—U.P.—A mother of two children has revealed she "couldn't wait any longer" to get back to her youngsters and agreed to a jury decision of life imprisonment for a man.

Mrs. Helen Flinn said she felt there was insufficient evidence to convict Raymond Edwards, 48, Mitchell, Ind., at his trial on charges of raping an 11-year-old girl.

Mrs. Flinn said, however, that she agreed to the conviction as the jury could be discharged "because I knew I had those children at home and we could never get out of there if we tried to argue it out with the others."

Eugene Area Reports Sleeping Sickness

Salem—U.P.—This year's first Willamette valley case of sleeping sickness in horses was reported from the Eugene area to the State Agriculture Department Thursday.

The Lane county report brought the state total for this

week to four cases. The other three were in Eastern Oregon. State Veterinarian Dr. K. J. Peterson said the disease is on the decline in eastern Oregon due to rapid and thorough vaccination of horses in affected areas.

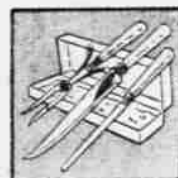

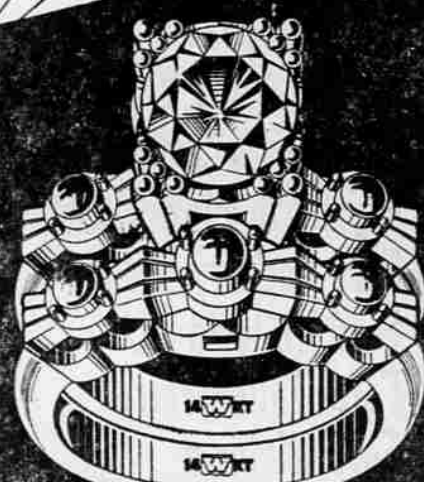
