Hundreds Gather To See Apparition Of Virgin Mary
East Los Angeles, Calif.—(U.P.) Hundreds of persons, some carrying candles and money offerings, continued to gather today in front of a modest home where inside appears an alleged apparition of the Virgin Mary on paper which backed a painting of Our Lady of Gaudalupe.
Many stood in line during the night to enter the home of Louis Acosta and view an alleged outline of the Virgin Mary which reportedly appeared on the tissue paper backing after Acosta removed the old painting from its frame.
"I can't explain it and just don't know what to do," Acosta said. "People have been coming day and night."
The 36-year-old mechanic said he was bringing the painting from the home of his deceased mother last Monday night and the glass in the frame shattered. He claimed he took the painting out of the frame and carefully put it in a drawer when he arrived home.
"When I returned 15 minutes later, I saw what I thought was the same picture back in the frame," Acosta said. "It scared my wife."
Word of the discovery at first was only related by Acosta to a few friends but by yesterday the news had spread and hundreds of persons began gathering at the home. It was estimated that some 2,000 persons had crowded the home in the past two days. Sheriff's deputies were called yesterday to handle the crowds converging on the home.
Some observers claimed the picture appeared to have become watersoaked and theorized that the new image underneath may have resulted from the wetting. Acosta, however, maintained that it did not appear to be the same picture. The Rev. Joseph Liobet, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Soledad, would make no immediate statement after examining the picture.
Acosta lives in a neighborhood inhabited by many persons of Mexican descent. Our Lady of Gaudalupe is Mexico's patron saint.

Authoritative Appraisal Made of Dead Sea Scrolls
(Editor's note: The study of the Dead Sea Scrolls has progressed to the point where scholars feel they can make an authoritative appraisal of their impact on traditional religious belief.)

Washington — (U.P.) — Leading scholars are now convinced that the famous Dead Sea Scrolls will have very little, if any, effect on traditional religious beliefs.
The sensational theory that these ancient manuscripts might shake the foundations of Christian faith in the Divinity of Jesus Christ has been rejected by an overwhelming majority of competent authorities. It recently was repudiated even by the French scholar, Andre Dupont-Sommer, who originated it.
Dupont-Sommer, a former Catholic priest who left the church, set off a sharp controversy by tracing parallels between the New Testament story of Jesus and the career of a "teacher of righteousness" mentioned in some of the scrolls dated more than a century before the birth of Christ.
Scrolls Challenged Uniqueness
The French scholar's views were given wide circulation in this country last year in Edmund Wilson's best-selling book, "The Scrolls From The Dead Sea." Wilson argued — and a number of unitarian clergymen and other "religious liberals" agreed — that the Scrolls challenged the uniqueness of Jesus.
Protestant and Catholic scholars who worked on the Scrolls raised a strong protest against this interpretation. They said the parallel tracers had tortured the text of the Scrolls in an effort to read counterparts of Christian doctrines into the vague and ambiguous passages and even into "holes in the leather" where the original language could only be guessed at.
Prof. Millar Burrows of Yale, one of the scholars who discovered the Scrolls since their discovery, analyzed their contents in detail in his book, "The Dead Sea Scrolls." His conclusion:
"There is no danger... that our understanding of the New Testament will be so revolutionized by them as to require a revision of any basic article of Christian faith."
The same verdict was expressed by Catholic Msgr. Patrick W. Skehan, director of the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem.
No Need For Revision
A prominent Jewish scholar, Dr. Samuel Sandmel of Cincinnati, agreed that the Scrolls had been "accorded a fantastic welcome entirely out of proportion to their significance." He said he could find nothing to indicate "any need to reconsider or revise any theories about Christian origins."
The possibility of protracted controversy diminished sharply this summer when Dupont-Sommer himself "clarified" his views.
"I never claimed that the Dead Sea Scrolls could strike a blow against the 'uniqueness' of Jesus," he said. "I believe that the Scrolls do not deny the Divinity of Jesus even in the sense of 'Son of God Incarnate.' In the general sense, viewed as a whole, the originality of the Christian church seems to me to remain unchallenged."
Authorities now feel justified in offering the following firm conclusions about the Scrolls:
1. The seven relatively complete manuscripts and upwards of 400 fragmentary manuscripts found in the caves are unquestionably authentic. They were written by ascetic Jewish monks during the period approximately 200 B.C. to 70 A.D.
Parts Of Old Testament
2. The scrolls were part of the sect's extensive religious library and include fragments of virtually every known book of the Hebrew (Old Testament) Bible with the possible exception of Esther. One is a nearly complete manuscript of the Book of Isaiah which is about 1,000 years older than the earliest version previously available.
3. There are only slight differences in the Scrolls compared with documents previously used as a basis for translating the Old Testament.
