

St. Mary's, Sacred Heart Vie Saturday

Fans who have followed the fortunes of St. Mary's of Medford to two consecutive Jackson County B league football championships will see a club with a nucleus of veterans and supplemented by inexperienced but promising players Saturday night when the Crusaders oppose Sacred Heart of Klamath Falls at the senior high stadium.

Game time is 8 p.m. There is no loop or district significance to the opener for both schools except that the tussle will afford some comparison with Klamath county clubs which are in St. Mary's district.

Possible offensive starters for SM are John Brunk and Richard Cooper, ends; Dave Crevier and Dave Goodman, guards; Francis Murphy and Alton Gerren, tackles; James Miller, center and Jim Darland, Ed Fogel, Dick Hayes and Ron Pruitt, backs.

Dave Espey, Rodney Read and Terry Cooper could start in the backfield and are expected to see considerable duty along with Jack Daley, Darland and Fogel were linemen last year.

Read and Darland may be defensive ends with Goodman and Michael Feix guards and Gerren and Murphy tackles. Line-backers may be chosen from among Miller, George Lucas, Crevier and Feix and the halfbacks from among Fogel, Espey and Pruitt with Terry Cooper at safety.

Terry Cooper and Lucas are freshmen. Goodman is a transfer from Jacksonville who played football at Prescott, Ariz. Jack Daley, a transfer back from Jacksonville, has seen limited practice.

Beavers Cop 7th Straight; Mounties End Loss Streak

The Vancouver Mounties finally broke a 10-game losing streak Thursday night, second longest of the Pacific Coast league season, but it took them 20 hits to do it.

And despite their 13-7 victory over the Los Angeles Angels, a win by seventh-place San Diego left the Mounties seven games behind in the PCL cellar and snuffed out any last faint hopes of climbing out.

The Padres edged Hollywood 5-4; the San Francisco Seals nudged Sacramento 4-3; and the Portland Beavers rolled to their seventh win in a row with a 5-1 decision over second-place Seattle.

With just 11 games left to play, it will take a mighty surge by the Mounties and a total collapse by the Padres to lift the Canadians out of the eighth spot they've been stuck in since early May.

Two Triples
George Metkovich rapped two triples for the Mounties, each of them driving in a run. The Mounties broke it open with four runs in the eighth after the Angels had gnawed away to within a run of tying it.

Dick Sisler, with two singles, drove in three runs including what proved to be the winning marker in San Diego's win. Eddie Evers (9-18) took over in the seventh and staggered in for the victory. He took over from Vic Lombardi, who blanked the Stars on one hit over the first five frames, then weakened.

Portland's Sam Calderone broke up a pitching duel at Seattle between Bob Darnell and the Rainiers' Bud Podbielan when he bashed a two-run homer in the seventh.

Gary Kaiser and Wayne Christian could be ends, Ron Nelson and Dean Tibbitts, tackles, Mike Kaiser and Jim Bunker, guards and Larry Dadenhoff, center. Jerry Mitchell, 235 pounder, could be in the starting line.
