Some Questions
Some of us will cast our ballots on what we feel the parties stand for; others will think more in terms of the qualifications of the particular candidates. Many of us will try to combine these two considerations; acknowledging the importance of party principles but at the same time trying to judge the qualifications of the individual for the job.

Here are some of the questions you may want to ask:
Does the candidate for President have the ability to understand the needs and wishes of the electorate and at the same time the qualities of leadership that will inspire the people to the best that is in them?

How will he get along with Congress? How well will he be able to persuade Congress to work with him for what he and those who elected him conceive to be the national interest?

Has he the ability to judge people and so place them in important administrative positions that a coherent national policy can be put into effect?

Does he have a clear understanding of the inner workings of government and the relationships of the various departments to one another and to the public?

Does he have an understanding of the basic elements which make the U. S. economy tick and a clear picture of the relationship of our economy to that of other countries?

Does he have the ability to take the lead in the field of foreign relations and to lead in a positive program for building a peaceful world?

Lamb Plentiful In Oregon Now College States

Corvallis — Plentiful supplies of Oregon spring lamb should assure attractive prices to wise shoppers for the next few weeks, reports W. Y. Fowler, Oregon State college livestock marketing specialist.

Late spring weather and a late harvest delayed finish of lamb usually sold outside the state. But producer difficulties have resulted in abundant supplies for Oregonians' immediate table use or locker storage.

At the same time, Mr. Fowler says larger than normal sales of lamb in Oregon are resulting from regularly available supplies and improved marketing. He adds, however, that good lamb, grading USDA Spring should remain in especially good supply and value through September.

Lamb cuts usually liked best by meat shoppers are from carcasses in the 40 to 55-pound weight limits. Beyond that weight, carcasses that grade "good" may border on less desirable lamb classes.

Zelma Reagle, OSC food marketing specialist, offers these hints for selection and cooking of lamb:

Color of flesh, fat and bone and purple U. S. Good grade stamp are most reliable guides to quality lamb purchases. Lean of good lamb should be firm, light to medium pink; fat firm, creamy white or slightly pink and bones soft and reddish. A purplish cast on the flesh indicates that lamb has not had enough finish.

Lamb sold by the carcass is usually priced lower pound for pound than that sold by cuts over retail counters. However, fat is not trimmed in carcass purchases. But if carcass is good quality, fat loss should not be too great, Miss Reagle says.

"Bargains and specials" on lamb may be a money-saving way to freeze current good supplies for later use. But beware of "specials" unless you know the quality of lamb is good, advise OSC specialists. Find out, too, if packaging costs are included in quoted prices. If you have to pay extra for packaging and freezing, cost per pound goes up.

Less well-known lamb cuts are just as nutritious and often less per pound than more popular leg of lamb and rolled roasts, says the OSC expert. Marbling in lamb is not important. Tenderness depends on cooking method and meat grade. Suggested ways to fix some of these less well-known cuts are: barbecue lamb ribs, stuff shoulder roast with mint dressing broil lamburger patties with pineapple rings or braise lamb shanks and serve with fresh vegetables. Home extension agents can provide recipes and other cooking helps.

could have written a first rate novel when so many others, older and wiser, got only rejection slips.

"Everybody says now that I've had this success I must write more, and then they ask 'What are you working on now?'" Miss Daniels said. "It sort of freezes me."

She sat curled in a corner of a couch in her hotel suite, looking even smaller than her 95 pounds and younger than her years. Yellow roses on the coffee table and telegrams piled on the desk were evidence of recognized achievement.

Miss Daniels' first novel "Caleb My Son," was published this week by Lippincott and hailed by reviewers as a "remarkable" book by a writer of "impressive talent."

Her story tells the tragedy of a Negro family, caught in the conflicts brought by the Supreme Court's desegregation decision. The first person to read it was her father, Jonathon Daniels, newspaper editor and publisher in Raleigh, N. C., and a former official of the government.

"He tells me now that he was afraid to read it," Lucy said, "because he didn't want to have to tell me it was no good."

Instead he read it and realized that his daughter had written a very good book, and encouraged her to send it to a publisher.

"I had been away from home for several years, and when I went back last summer I had a chance to see afresh the Negro and white people I had known all my life," Miss Daniels said. "Trying patiently to explain that persistent question . . . 'how come?'"

"I started the book in September and gave it to my father to read in January. I wasn't writing the book to be published. I was still teaching myself to write."

"What is she working on now?" That other irresistible question brings a rueful smile to Miss Daniels' face.

"I am working on short stories," she said. "It isn't as foreboding as saying, 'Now, I am going to sit down and write a novel.'"

Cost of the insurance is \$1.25 for the school year, members said. They will also be available for assistance to those registering for the school year.

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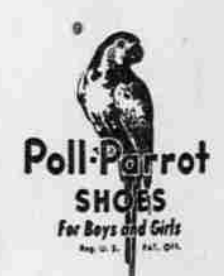
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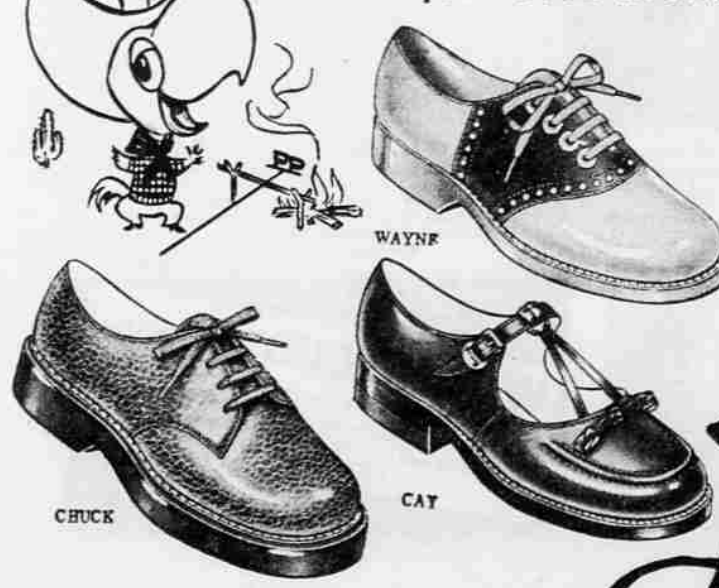
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
