Royal Family of Ethiopia Now Visible in Sky at Night

Are you acquainted with the Royal Family of Ethiopia? It is composed of four members, the father, mother, daughter, and the brave young man who became the daughter's husband. They do not live in your hometown. As becomes royalty, they reside on the "heights" and may be seen in the northern and northeastern sky each clear evening after 9 p.m.

Cepheus, the king, Cassiopeia, the queen, and Andromeda, the daughter, were recently discussed in this column. So today, Perseus, the brave young son-in-law will engage our attention. Thrown into Sea

According to mythology, a jealous uncle locked both Perseus and Danae, his mother, in a chest and threw them into the sea. Fortunately, a fisherman rescued them and took them to King Polydectes of Seriphus, who treated them kindly for years.

But when Perseus had grown to manhood, King Polydectes also became jealous and sent him to slay the Gorgon, Medusa, a frightful creature with snakes for hair, thus hoping to be rid of Perseus.

Changes To Stone

Anyone who looked directly at Medusa would be instantly changed to stone, but using a brightly polished shield lent to him by the goddess, Minerva, Perseus saw only the Gorgon's reflection in the mirror-like surface. A pair of winged sandals lent to Perseus by Mercury gave great speed to his movements.

From the three ugly sisters who had only one eye which each used in turn, Perseus learned the location of the sleeping Medusa and soon her head reposed in his magic purse, which would change its size to accommodate any article placed within it.

Treated Unkindly

Atlas, fearing that Perseus might take some of the golden apples from his garden, treated him unkindly when he stopped for food on his homeward journey. Perseus exposed the head of Medusa to Atlas, thereby changing him into stone. This giant king still rests in the Atlas Mountains.

Perseus next discovered the unhappy Andromeda waiting for the monster to devour her. The Gorgon's head was again displayed and the approaching creature became a stony mass.

Cepheus, the king and father of Andromeda, in gratitude said to Perseus, "I will give you anything you desire."

Perseus then asked to have Andromeda for his wife. They lived happily ever after and when their life ended, Jupiter gave them a place in the heavens.

Family Located

All four members of the Royal Family of Ethiopia may be easily located. The pointed crown of Cepheus, the king, is very high in the sky, slightly east of north, lying upside-down in the Milky Way. Find the pointers of the Big Dipper. Follow a straight line from the Pointers to the North Star, then continue this line for about one-half the distance between the Pointers and Polaris.

This imaginary line will reach the star, which marks the point of the crown. (Remember, the crown is upside-down.) Above the point, four stars outline a rectangle which is part of the band of the crown.

Also in the Milky Way, below and a little to the right or east of Cepheus, the "W" of Cassiopeia's chair is standing on its side.

Follow the Milky Way downward and in the northeast, below Cassiopeia you will find a beautiful group of stars that represents Perseus, the rescuer. A line of three stars forms the body and from the bottom star in this line extended two uneven legs. It takes a great deal of imagination to see a man in this

sky picture. Some people think that it resembles a rather fancy capital "A." If you remember that Perseus lies in the Milky Way just below the "W" of Cassiopeia you can find it without any trouble.

Andromeda Located
Andromeda, the beautiful daughter, does not lie in the Milky Way, but is found slightly north of east. Locate the Great Square of Pegasus in the eastern sky, resting on one corner and appearing diamond-like in shape. Find the star farthest to the left or north in this diamond.

This star, which forms part of the Great Square, also represents the shoulders of Andromeda. The beautiful maiden has no head. Two lines of stars extending to the left form a long, very slender and slightly curved "V." This is Andromeda as she awaited the monster's arrival. You can always find it between the Great Square and Perseus.

Thus, we have Cassiopeia following her husband, Cepheus, across the sky, while Perseus seems to be running towards Andromeda.

Stratton 'Helpful' In Senate Probe

Chicago—(U.P.)—Senate investigators reported Gov. William G. Stratton was "very helpful" in a closed session at which they questioned him about bankers' contributions to political campaigns.

Stratton, a candidate for reelection, later called his meeting with personnel of the U.S. Senate Banking and Currency committee a "very interesting discussion."

Robert Wallace, one of the committee investigators, refused to disclose what the Republican governor said at the closed meeting Thursday. But Wallace added Stratton was "very helpful."

Wallace emphasized he had no desire to "throw a cloud" over Stratton's record as treasurer in previous state administrations, even though he could not disclose what was said.

Wallace said the inquiry concentrated on Stratton's two terms as state treasurer and on "the relationship between political contributions of banks and the placement of state funds in banks."

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Four People Hurt As Vehicles Hit Head-On Friday

Four people were hospitalized Friday evening with injuries sustained in a head-on collision involving a station wagon and a pick-up, about 2 1/2 miles east of the White Star Inn on the Green Springs highway, state police reported Saturday.

To Hospitals
Milo Hardin, 827 Palm st., Medford, operator of the station wagon, was taken to Sacred Heart hospital for treatment of head cuts and other minor injuries. Lloyd Franklin Atkins, 39, Klamath Falls, driver of the pick-up, was taken to Ashland General hospital for treatment of an injured arm. Also taken to Ashland General hospital were Atkins' wife, Mrs. Rosetta B. Atkins, who sustained fractured ribs and leg lacerations, and Otto Mickelson, Klamath Falls, suffering from a bruised chest.

Mrs. Atkins and Mickelson were passengers in the pick-up. All of the accident victims were taken to hospitals by Litwiler's ambulance of Ashland, state police said.

Officers reported Hardin was traveling west and Atkins was traveling east, when the Hardin vehicle apparently struck a block of wood in the road. According to the report, the station wagon went out of control, moved into the eastbound lane and the two vehicles hit head-on.

Both the station wagon and the pick-up were reported extensively damaged and were taken by wrecker to Klamath Falls.

District to Provide Bus Transportation
Lone Pine school district will provide transportation for all junior high and high school students this year, Mrs. Estelle Ballard, district clerk, has announced.

The recently purchased bus will travel via Hillcrest rd. to Camp Prescott and will pick up junior high and high school students on that route at 7:15 a.m. It will then travel along Cherry lane and students living in the vicinity of the golf course will be picked up about 7:25 a.m. Students living near Corona ave. and the section formerly known as the Kenwood district, will be picked up at 7:40 a.m. Remainder of the route will be the same as last year.

Transportation for elementary pupils will be the same as last year, Mrs. Ballard said. The clerk will be at the school mornings until noon to sign non-high tuition blanks for students.

Washington—(U.P.)—Associate Justice Sherman Minton Friday announced his retirement from the Supreme Court.

Minton said he is retiring because of poor health, effective Oct. 15.

Minton announced his intentions in a letter to President Eisenhower this morning. He said that because of a circulatory condition in his legs he did not feel he could carry out "the exacting duties" of his office.

Later he told a reporter "there was a time when they waited on an elderly justice and told him he wasn't doing his work right. I don't want that to happen to me."

Minton, who will be 66 Oct. 20, has been obliged, for the past year, to use a cane and appears to walk with difficulty.

ASSOCIATE JUSTICE MINTON RETIRES
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New Law Amendments Clarify Farmer's Status

(Editor's Note: The following is one of a series of articles prepared by the Social Security administration describing important changes in the Social Security law enacted by Congress this year. According to the local Social Security office, they will affect more than 600 women in Jackson and Josephine counties, some 200 or 300 disabled persons and an unknown but considerable number of lawyers, dentists and other professional people as well as farmers.)

The 1936 amendments to the social security law includes several provisions which make it easier for a self-employed farmer or rancher to understand his rights under the old-age and survivors insurance program. One of these relates to share-farming or share-cropping.

Congress realized that there was need for clarification of the status of the share-cropper as a self-employed farmer for social security purposes. Persons who farm another person's land on a share arrangement, they are self-employed farmers if their share depends on the total amount produced, even in cases

where the landowner has a lot to say about the way the farm is run.

Another amendment will help clear up questions about crew leaders ("labor contractors" or "row bosses") in relation to the short period workers they furnish to farmers for the harvesting of fruits and vegetables or

the picking or cropping of cotton.

May Be Covered

These farm workers may be covered by the social security law, but in the past it has sometimes not been easy to tell whether the employer of the members of the crew was the farmer who was having the work done or the crew leader (or "labor contractor" or "row boss"). The amended law makes it easier to tell who is the employer.

If one is a crew leader, the crew members he furnishes and pays are his employees unless he and the farmer have entered into a written agreement which shows that he is the farmer's employee.

If one is a farm operator using crew workers, and he has entered into a written agreement with the crew leader which shows that the leader is his employee, then the crew members are also his employees. This provision is effective for work performed after Dec. 31, 1936.

Farm Crews

Because members of a farm crew move from farm to farm and area to area, a greater part of their cash farm wages will

be covered by social security where the crew leader is the employer, as these short-period workers generally work for the same crew leader longer than for any single farm operator. Moreover, where the crew leader is the employer, the farmer is relieved of the responsibility of record keeping, social security tax withholding, and reporting, and the obligation of getting information about each of the workers with whom he may have only a brief contact.

Having only one employer instead of several different employers in connection with doing the same work, they will more easily meet the \$150 cash wage and 20-day time tests which apply to their farm work for each employer.

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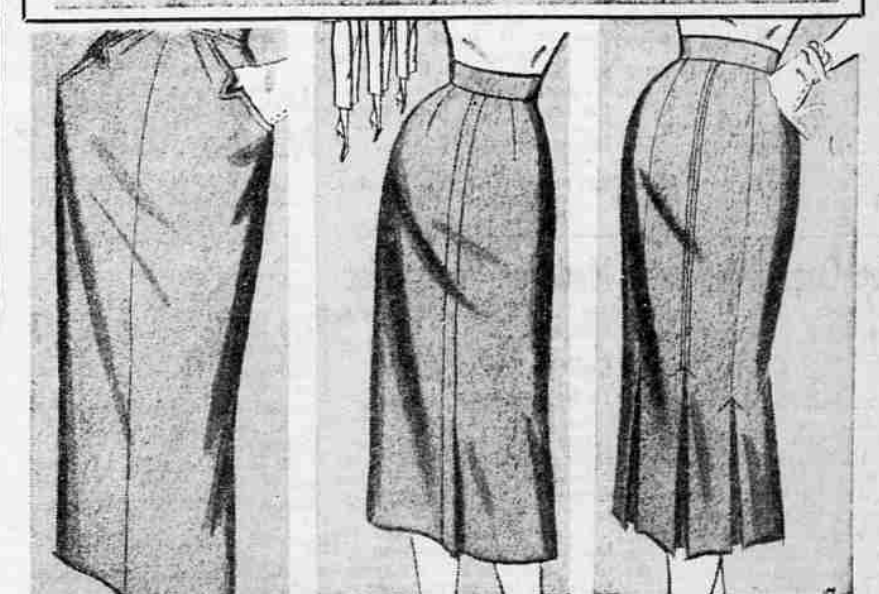


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
