

Democratic Governor Retained in Maine

\$5,721,200 Benefits Sought For Crater Lake National Park

Crater Lake National Park is scheduled for development and improvement estimated to cost about \$5,721,200 under proposals in the National Park Service's Mission 66 program, Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton announced today.

Proposals include about \$3,798,100 for construction of roads and trails, and \$1,923,100 for buildings and utilities, Seaton said. These expenditures, he added, do not reflect the cost of increases to the park staff for management and protection or for maintenance and rehabilitation of present facilities which are provided for under the long-range program.

Long Range Program

Seaton explained that Mission 66 is the long-range program for improved visitor facilities and increased protection of all areas of the national park system.

It was launched with the firm endorsement of President Eisenhower after Douglas McKay, Secretary of the Interior, and Conrad L. Wirth, National Park Service director, outlined its objective at a cabinet meeting early this year.

The program is scheduled for completion in 1966, the golden anniversary of the National Park Service. Funds to get the program started were provided in the 1957 department of the interior appropriation act.

Construction to be initiated this year at Crater Lake will include a new campground at Annie Springs to contain parking area, fireplaces, restrooms, tables, and space for tents and trailers to cost \$72,700; a 350-foot covered walkway from the visitor center to the Sinnott Memorial for use during winter or inclement weather, \$30,000; and construction and extension of roads, trails, and walks at headquarters, \$38,000. The existing campgrounds at Annie Springs will continue in operation and be used for overflow camping.

Other Projects

Other projects in the Mission 66 program for Crater Lake National Park include:

1. Construction of a visitor center at Rim Village to house museum exhibits, an auditorium for lectures and other visitor orientation and interpretation devices, and the enclosing of the Sinnott Memorial so that it can be used in winter time.
2. Installation of roadside exhibits to help carry out the park's interpretive program; expansion and improvement of camping and picnicking facilities and the placement of smaller picnic areas along park roads.
3. Expansion and improvement of the park's trail system, including relocation of the present hazardous trail from Rim Village to the lake.
4. Widening and resurfacing of existing roads and relocation of the scenic Rim Road in the

Medford Resident Dies in Norway

Mrs. Paul Janney, a resident of Medford since about 1910, died suddenly in Urna, Norway, yesterday, according to information received this morning at the Medford branch of the First National bank, from State Department officials in Oslo. Death resulted presumably from a heart attack.

Mrs. Janney, who lived on Janney lane in the Oak Grove district, was touring Europe with friends at the time of her death. She left Medford July 24. Born and reared in Minneapolis, she would have been 83 in October.

Mrs. Janney was active in many organizations in Medford. She had been treasurer of Medford League of Women Voters ever since its organization, belonged to the Colony club and Jackson County Republican Women, had worked in the Altar guild of St. Mark's Episcopal church for many years and recently became a member of Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations' association.

Mr. Janney died several years ago, and there are no close surviving relatives. According to the wire the body is being held in the village chapel at Urna awaiting funeral arrangements to be made by her executors in Medford.

vicinity of Kerr Notch with overlooks and interpretive facilities provided at scenic points.

5. Expansion of utilities to serve augmented and improved facilities and such increases to the park staff as are required to meet protection, interpretation and maintenance needs.

Visitors Recorded

More than 343,000 visitors were recorded at Crater Lake last year. Many of them arrived during the winter when the area's deep snows and extreme slopes lend themselves to skiing, sledding and snowshoeing.

To adequately serve the increased visitor-usage of the parks considerable construction was accomplished this past year. The Annie Creek bridge, completed recently at a cost of \$120,780 was opened to visitor traffic this summer, and construction costing \$92,573 will be completed before fall at the Goodbye Creek bridge. Both are important bridges that were washed away by a flood many years ago and replaced by temporary spans.

Driver Critically Injured in Accident

A 16-year-old Ashland girl, Ruth Marie Bean, was in critical condition today at Ashland General hospital, where she was taken at 2:35 p.m. yesterday after the car she was driving failed to negotiate a curve on East Main rd. in Ashland, struck a power pole and overturned.

All five of her teen-age passengers received less serious injuries and two were still hospitalized today.

Speed Estimated

State police said they were informed the vehicle was traveling south at an estimated 30 to 90 miles per hour when it went out of control on a curve to the right.

Officers said the car, registered to Carmen Bean, 807 Mary Jane ave., Ashland, was a total wreck.

Miss Bean is reported suffering from fractures of the right hip, left leg, and left wrist, and loss of blood. Hospital attendants said she has received five transfusions since the accident. State police officers rushed a supply of blood from Medford to the Ashland hospital last night.

Also injured were Robert Dale Hodgins, 15, Gerald Ray Allen, 14, Keith Douglas Fitch, 15, William Earl Maurer, 15, and Jerry Lee Pepper, 15, all of Ashland. The Pepper, Fitch and Maurer boys were released from the hospital after treatment for minor injuries. Young Hodgins is reported in good condition and is suffering from lacerations and bruises. Allen was reported to have spent a "bad" night and is suffering from fractures.

Miss Bean and Allen were taken to the hospital by Lill-willer's Ambulance service and the others were taken to the hospital by a passing motorist, state police said.

Two Killed, Six Hurt in Accident

Eureka, Calif. — (U.P.) — Two persons were dead and six others injured, three seriously, as the result of a collision Monday of a station wagon and a logging truck.

The station wagon, with eight passengers, crashed into the rear of the slow moving truck on U.S. 101 about 20 miles north of here.

Dead were Gale Barney, 31, Arcata, Calif., pharmacist, and his daughter, Kathy, 10.

Hospitalized with serious injuries were Barney's father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Barney, and his brother Keith, 23, who were visiting from Spanish Forks, Utah.

Barney's widow, Lu Wana 34, and his two younger daughters, Gloria, 8, and Galya, 3, suffered less serious injuries.

Britain, France Hint Suez Crisis Might Go to UN

Menzies Announces Plans for U. S. Trip

London — (U.P.) — Britain and France renewed their determination today to take "all appropriate measures" against any interference with freedom of shipping in the Suez Canal. Observers interpreted this to mean they would use force if necessary.

Australian Prime Minister Robert Gordon Menzies announced he planned to fly to Washington Thursday for talks with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles on the Suez crisis. Menzies headed the five-nation committee to the unsuccessful talks in Cairo. He already has given British and French leaders a fill-in.

But the wording of a joint communique issued after urgent consultations in London between French and British leaders gave a clue that the first move may come in the United Nations.

The communique's final words were a direct quotation from the preamble of the U.N. charter, "justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law."

It was violation of this justice and respect that Britain and France have committed themselves to resist.

Informed sources said British Prime Minister Anthony Eden and French Premier Guy Mollet considered taking the dispute to the United Nations. These sources said it was proposed to give the matter a "fast run" through the U.N. Security Council before taking any drastic steps.

Officials refused to say whether this move actually had been decided upon.

Blunt Warning

It was a blunt warning to Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser that France and Britain will act swiftly against mistreatment of their nationals in Egypt as well as against any attempt to upset the normal operations of the canal.

In Cairo today, Nasser said he was "preparing for the worst eventualities."

The Egyptian President, whose seizure of the canal touched off the crisis, said he is prepared to go to war to defend the canal. Earlier reports from Cairo told of the complete mobilization of all armed forces, including guardsmen and civilian units.

Planning Consultant Arrives in Medford

Hobart D. Pritchard, head of the Redding branch office of Hahn, Wise, and associates, planning consultant firm of Redwood City, Calif., was in Medford yesterday and this morning gathering data and conferring with city officials.

A six month contract paying the consultants \$300 per month was approved by the city planning commission in August. Under the agreement a Hahn, Wise representative is to visit Medford four days each month to help with planning problems.

Pritchard hoped to meet with the city planning commission last night, but the meeting was called off because of a quorum of members was not available. The next meeting is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 24.

Typhoon Emma Blamed for Missing AF Weather Plane

Tokyo — (U.P.) — American planes and Japanese ships failed today to find a trace of a U. S. Air Force weather plane missing since Monday when it flew into typhoon Emma to track the course of the dangerous storm.

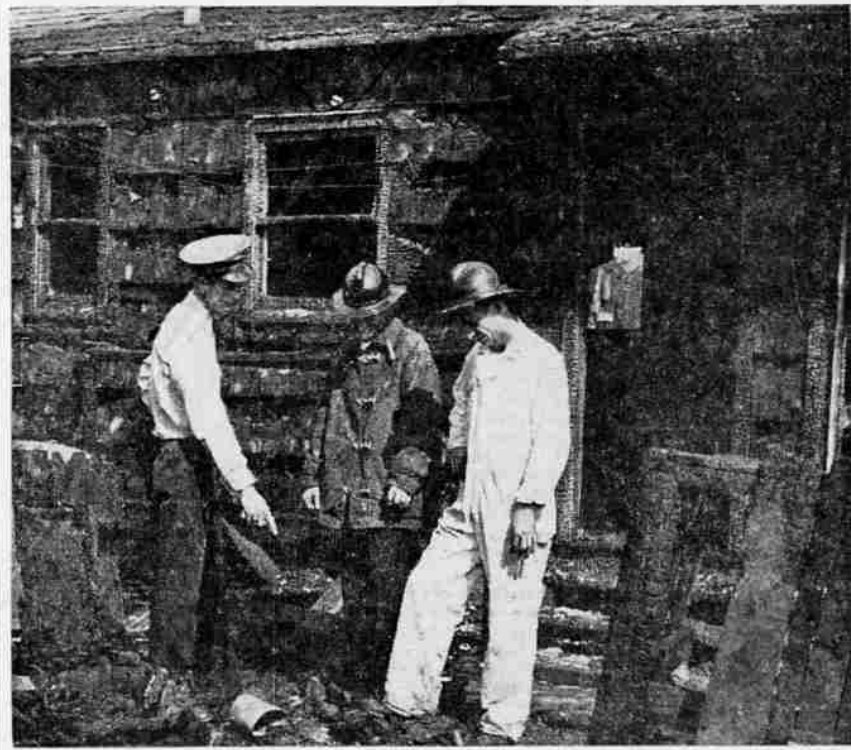
Sixteen men were aboard the aircraft, a B50 reconnaissance bomber. The Air Force discounted the possibility the B50 had been shot down or strayed over Soviet territory. A spokesman blamed only the typhoon.

Thirty eight U. S. Air Force planes and ten Japanese maritime safety ships criss-crossed a 70,000 square mile area midway between Japan and Siberia during daylight hours and B29s were ordered out tonight to look for lights.

But rising seas dimmed hopes of finding the Americans since high waves can conceal a floating man on a life raft.

Reports from Korea, delayed because of disrupted communications, said the typhoon killed 11 persons in a glancing sideswipe at Korea before spending itself in the Japan sea. Eleven others were reported missing.

The typhoon, which inflicted heavy damage earlier on Japan and Okinawa, was reported moving toward Soviet-held Sakhalin, getting weaker as it went along. Four deaths were reported on Okinawa, where Emma inflicted \$10 million damage. Six persons were killed in the Philippines. Nineteen died in Japan.

Lumber Company Plane Crash Lands On California Beach

A plane owned by Ross Lumber company, Medford, crashed landed on a southern California beach Sunday without serious injury to the pilot or three passengers, it was learned here today.

Aboard the plane were regular Ross Lumber company pilot, Elmer Riley, Los Angeles; Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ross, Oakland, Calif.; and Carl Lovegren, address unknown.

Headed for Los Angeles

Ivan Harrington, a Ross Lumber company employee at the Medford office, said this morning the twin engine plane was traveling from San Diego to Los Angeles.

Harrington, who talked to Ross by phone yesterday, quoted him as saying one engine went dead, shortly after take-off. The pilot tried to fly to the Santa Anna airport, but soon the second engine developed trouble. Riley was forced to crash land on the ocean beach. Because of bathers and picnickers on the beach he had to choose a comparatively rough stretch and the undercarriage of the plane was badly damaged, Harrington said.

No Serious Injuries

The occupants were uninjured except for Ross, who is believed to have suffered a sprained ankle.

The Rosses are now at their home in Oakland. They were returning home after a visit to the Delmar race track near San Diego where several horses owned by Ross were running in races.

The plane is regularly kept at Los Angeles. Harrington said it was not known whether or not salvage attempts would be made.

One, Perhaps Two Seats in Congress Won by Democrats

Muskie Gets About 60 Per Cent of Votes

Portland, Maine — (U.P.) — Democrats retained the governorship and won one and possibly two of the three congressional seats in this traditionally Republican state in the nation's first election this year, unofficial returns showed today.

Gov. Edmund S. Muskie, first Democratic governor in Maine in 20 years, won a second term Monday by overwhelmingly defeating Republican Willis A. Trafton Jr., speaker of the Maine House of Representatives.

Muskie, 42-year-old lawyer, became the second Democrat to be reelected governor since the Civil War. Muskie captured nearly 60 per cent and Trafton 40 per cent of the total 304,468 votes cast for governor.

Recount Certain

A recount was certain in the First Congressional District where James O. Oliver, a Democrat, apparently beat Republican incumbent Robert Hale. The United Press tally showed Oliver, a former Republican, beat Hale by only 90 votes out of a total of 115,000 votes.

Hale declined to concede and said a recount was "certain." Oliver refused to issue a victory statement.

Virtually complete but unofficial returns from Maine's 630 precincts gave Muskie 169,690 votes to 118,081 for Trafton.

Muskie's vote-getting power spilled over into the races for Maine's three congressional seats, now held by Republicans. The state's two U.S. Senate seats were not at stake this year.

Democratic state chairman Frank M. Coffin of Lewiston captured the second congressional seat being vacated by retiring Rep. Charles P. Nelson of Augusta by defeating state Sen. James L. Reid of Hallowell.

Impossible to Predict

With but two of 156 first district precincts unreported, former Republican-turned-Democrat James P. Oliver of Cape Elizabeth apparently had defeated incumbent Republican Rep. Robert Hale of Portland. However, both Hale and Oliver agreed early today the final outcome was impossible to predict.

Republican incumbent Clifford G. McIntire trounced his fellow Presque Isle townsman, Democrat Kenneth B. Colbath.

Two Youths Accused Of Jacksonville Blast

Two 15-year-old boys from Jacksonville were arrested and confined to county jail yesterday by the county sheriff's office, charged with malicious destruction of private property in connection with an explosion in downtown Jacksonville Monday morning, Sept. 4.

The sheriff's office said the two juveniles dropped gasoline and lighted matches into a caped well near the sidewalk at intersection of Third and California sts in Jacksonville.

Only damage reported, according to the sheriff's office, was the destruction of the well cap. Both boys were turned over to county juvenile authorities, the sheriff's office said.
