Three People Injured in Car Accidents in Jackson County

Two people were injured and a third was cited for failure to yield the right of way after a two-car collision at the intersection of Howard ave. and Berrydale ave. at 6:25 p.m. Monday, state police reported this morning.

Billy Lee Marshall, 25, of 2685 Connell ave., driver of one of the vehicles, and his wife Vidi Marie, 22, were taken by Medford Ambulance service to Rogue Valley hospital. Marshall suffered minor lacerations and his wife, an expectant mother, suffered lacerations and a concussion. Their 21-month-old son, David Edwin, was reported uninjured.

According to the officers' report, Marshall was traveling west on Howard ave., when his car collided at the intersection with a vehicle operated by Bryan Douglas Sewell, 15, route 2, box 115, Central Point. Officers said Sewell's car skidded 49 feet before striking the Marshall vehicle. The Marshall car was knocked against a power pole and all three occupants were thrown from the car.

Driver Not Hurt—Sewell was uninjured, officers said.

Roy Johnson, 18, son of Claude W. Johnson of 3512 Howard ave., suffered a sprained back and shock at 5:35 a.m. today when the car he was operating ran off highway 66 and struck a tree near Mountain View Camp east of Lincoln, according to state police.
