Electrical Parts Developed For Use In Intense Heat

New York—(AP)—Electrical equipment that can break through the "thermal barrier" has been developed by the General Electric company, it was announced Monday.

Company spokesmen said engineers had produced the equipment after a long technical battle against heat produced by aircraft at high speed.

The engineers have built radios, transformers, motors and other electrical equipment that can withstand temperatures up to 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit, as well as intense atomic radiation. The company explained that with this development, nuclear-powered aircraft are nearer to reality, as much of the weight used to shield atomic reactors may be eliminated.

Shows Models
Dr. C. G. Suits, GE vice president and director of research, showed newsmen models of what he called "revolutionary" electronic circuits and devices that operate "red-hot" at "skin sizzling" temperatures.

He showed how one circuit developed could pick up and amplify a radio signal even while the equipment was in direct contact with the flames produced by three blow torches.

The GE officials explained that the developments were made through experimentation with ceramics, the "miracle" metal titanium, and lead pellets the size of aspirins. A ceramic-coated wire played an important part in the battle against heat at the "thermal barrier," heat so hot it can reduce glass to a milky puddle.

Homer Cummings Dies in Sleep

Washington—(AP)—Former Attorney General Homer Cummings, father of the famed Supreme court "packing" plan, died Monday at his home.

The 86-year-old lawyer had a heart ailment, Dr. Paul Dickens, his physician, said he died quietly in his sleep.

Cummings was the late President Roosevelt's first attorney general. He served nearly six years, retiring Jan. 1, 1939 to return to private law practice.

Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler said in a statement that the Democratic party mourns the "loss of a true friend and a tireless worker."

Although Cummings disagreed with some of the features of the New Deal, he fought vigorously to keep it alive.

He fathered the plan to enlarge the Supreme court which was regularly blocking New Deal laws. The plan was opposed violently in Congress by Democrats as well as Republicans and was defeated.

However, the result was that several older conservative court members stepped down, enabling Roosevelt to appoint a majority to the high court.

Police Seeking Cattle Rustlers by Airplane

Brisbane, Australia—(AP)—Police in low-flying airplanes covered miles of wilderness today in search of cattle rustlers who stole 800 steers worth \$45,000 in Australia's biggest cattle theft.

The animals disappeared from the 40,000-acre Acton Downs Cattle Station near Blackall in Central Queensland.

Within recent years American per capita annual use of textiles has increased from about 33 pounds to the present rate of 45 pounds.

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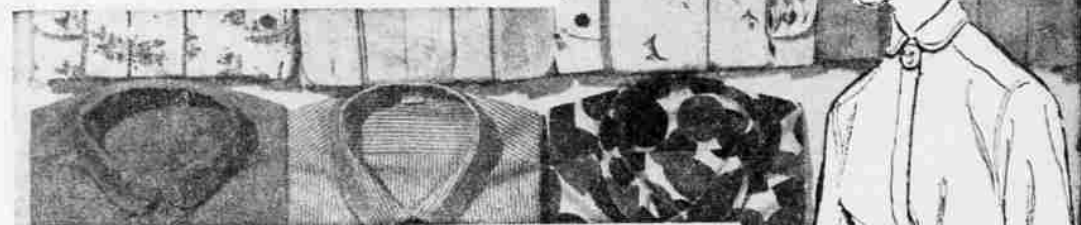
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
