Big Expansion Set For SOC; Stevenson Reports on Details

The state board of education gave major impetus to Southern Oregon college's expansion program by its approval last Friday of campus expansion and funds for building construction. Dr. Elmo Stevenson, SOC president, told the Medford Rotary club Tuesday.

At the luncheon meeting in the Jackson hotel, Dr. Stevenson reported that the college has approved acquisition of approximately 15 acres of property to be added to the campus, \$460,000 for a new science classroom building, and \$192,000 for a men's dormitory.

The additional property will bring SOC's campus acreage to 65.

Additional funds will be sought at the next legislative session for the new dormitory, to cost an estimated \$300,000. It is planned to accommodate 100 students, and will include a cafeteria style commons to serve 500 students. It will be located on Indiana st.

The new science building will be located west of the present campus buildings and south of Rocka st. If funds for both buildings are approved by the legislature, construction will begin in the summer of 1957.

Dr. Stevenson also emphasized need for a central heating plant. Funds for this project will also be sought from the legislature.

The college president said funds from the Britt estate here to be used in constructing the student union building have given real impetus to SOC's existing \$2 million investment in property and buildings.

Sees Increase
He predicted enrollment at Southern Oregon college this year would exceed 1,000 and by 1975 would reach 5,000. The migration of new people to Oregon and fast growing birth rates in this area clearly indicate the almost certain realization of this optimistic dream, the speaker said.

Within 15 years the college at Ashland will represent a capital investment of \$1,000,000 in property and \$8,000,000 in buildings and equipment if the rate of enrollment gains continue, Dr. Stevenson predicted.

Tribute was paid to Frank Van Dyke, Medford attorney and former member of the State Board of Higher Education, for his successful efforts to expand the functions of the Ashland college beyond general teachers' program of instruction with a more general curriculum qualifying for a BS degree. Judge Rodney Keating was lauded for expediting this program.

Dr. Stevenson stressed the need for more scholarship dollars and increased students loan funds, and pointed out the growing economic importance of the Ashland institution to the general economy of this area. He was introduced by Rotary program chairman Jack Wood.

1,698 Students Enroll In School District

Central Point — A total of 1,698 students have enrolled in the five schools in District 6-C. It was reported today by Superintendent of Schools H. P. Jewett.

Crater High school has 558; Central Point elementary school, 754; Hanby school, Gold Hill, 224; Margaret E. Patrick school, Gold Hill, 59; and Sams Valley school, 103.

The number of students to be enrolled at H. P. Jewett school in Central Point, scheduled to open Monday, will not be known until next week.

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Ike Opens Reelection Campaign

Activities of Gas Bill Lobbying Are Aired at Hearing

Washington — (U.P.) — Two officials testified today that the Gulf Oil Corp. made income tax deductions on \$111,000 it contributed to an "education" campaign on behalf of the recently vetoed natural gas bill.

They said the firm regarded the contribution as a legitimate business expense. They said the corporation did not deduct \$3,800 it contributed to the General Gas committee which frankly lobbied to pass the gas bill.

Two Witnesses
The two witnesses were Board Chairman Sidney A. Swensrud and General Counsel Archie D. Gray. They testified as the special Senate Lobbying committee resumed hearings on lobbying activities in connection with the gas bill.

Swensrud and Gray both said they considered the General Gas committee a lobbying organization designed to influence Congress in favor of the legislation.

Hines H. Baker, president; Herman P. Pressler, a director; and Walter F. Woodul, a legislative representative, all of the Humble Oil and Refining Co., also described the General Gas Committee as a lobbying organization.

Did Not Jibe

Sen. John J. McClellan, (D-Ark.), chairman of the Lobbying Committee, said the testimony did not jibe with that of Maston Nixon, General Gas Committee chairman who testified earlier that the group was primarily an "educational" organization.

Swensrud defended the \$111,000 contribution to the Natural

Gas and Oil Resources Committee as a business expense because the organization was engaged in "education" activities about the gas industry.

But under questioning by McClellan, he and Gray admitted that the company decided not to deduct the \$3,800 to the General Gas Committee after the lobbying group began its hearings.

Henry Owens Quits TID Board Post at Meeting

Talent—Henry Owens, a member of the board of directors of the Talent Irrigation district since 1947, resigned during a board meeting yesterday.

He did so because he has sold his property in the TID and moved from the district. State law requires directors to own property in the district they serve.

Appreciation Expressed

The other two members of the board, Homer Moore, president, and Dave Holmes, expressed their appreciation of Owens' long service, and passed a resolution to that effect.

Moore and Holmes appointed Evan Rasmussen, Fern Valley rd., to serve on the board until after the board's regular election in November. At that time a director to serve the balance of Owens' term, until Jan. 1, 1958, will be elected.

Moore's term on the board expires this year, so two board positions will be open at the Nov. 13 district election.

Neither Moore nor Rasmussen have decided yet whether or not to be candidates to succeed themselves, it was reported today.

Resolution Made

The resolution of tribute to Owens' work pointed out that he has served continuously for nine years, has "at all times exhibited the highest character and soundest judgment," and has "at all times shown patience, foresight and unusual fairness to all parties and has devoted innumerable hours of time and effort to the affairs of the district."

Walt Hoffbuh, secretary-manager of the district, reported this morning that clearing of timber on the site of the Deadwood tunnel, first section of the \$20 million Talent irrigation and reclamation project, has been sub-contracted by Lord Construction company of Portland, and that actual construction will get under way soon.

RENTS RISE

Portland — (U.P.) — Apartment rents are going up here. Owners today blamed increases ranging from \$2.50 to \$5 to as high as \$10-15 on rising costs and higher taxes. Some apartments put slight increases into effect on new tenants starting in August.

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Sturgis, Clinton Settle to Almost Normal Routine

The Kentucky National Guard moved two companies of troops under cover of darkness into Clay, Ky., Tuesday night and held back a jeering crowd while a Negro mother brought her two children to a white school today.

The maneuver left townspeople, who have been successful in keeping Negroes out of their school, completely surprised. When dawn broke, the sun gleamed on the guns of state troops.

Clay is a little community 11 miles south of Sturgis, another racial hotspot.

Sturgis and Clinton, Tenn., where Negroes have been admitted to integrated schools for the first time this fall, settled down to almost normal routine after days of violence.

Trouble in Texas

But a rock fight broke out between white and Negro youths at the Texarkana, Tex., Junior college which was ordered by the courts to integrate. Crowds of whites have kept a Negro girl there from attending classes.

A four-foot cross wrapped in kerosene-soaked cloth was set afire on the grounds of Dunbar High school for Negroes in Texas and four white and seven Negro boys were arrested.

A mass boycott of white pupils greeted the integration at Clay. Only four or five white children entered the building.

Enrollment of the Negro children was a reversal of Mrs. Gordon's announced decision of Tuesday to take them to a Negro school at Providence, Ky.

The crowd was orderly but jeers and insults were hurled at the guardsmen. Gov. A. B. Chandler is under severe criticism for calling out the National Guard in the western Kentucky school situation.

Fourth Polio Case Reported in County

Jackson county's fourth case of infantile paralysis in 1956 was reported late yesterday by Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer.

The patient, 9-year old Robert (Eric) Griffith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Griffith, 920 Broad st., Medford, is hospitalized with a mild case of non-paralytic polio, and is expected to go home today or tomorrow. He first became ill last Saturday. Dr. Merkel said, and the polio diagnosis was confirmed yesterday.

The boy had received two of the series of three Salk anti-polio shots, which may have accounted for the mildness of his case, Dr. Merkel indicated.

Salem — (U.P.) — Gov. Elmo Smith today extended a special invitation to Western governors to recognize the 20th anniversary of the formation in Portland of the Western Probation and Parole Association.

Two Prison Escapees Caught in Redlands

Redlands, Calif. — (U.P.) — Two of four San Quentin convicts who stole an airplane to flee from a prison road camp in Northern California Aug. 31, were captured without a struggle here last night in a police roadblock.

Special FBI Agent John F. Malone announced that Charles R. Morgan, 37, sentenced in Los

Angeles for kidnaping and robbery in 1947, and Edward Virgil, 26, of Sacramento, who was serving a term for robbery, were apprehended by Redlands police and San Bernardino sheriff's deputies. Both men were unarmed when arrested in the alleged stolen car.

Seen in Area
Arresting officers said they were alerted that the escapees had been seen in the area earlier in the day. The roadblock was set up in the heart of this city only a few hours before the convicts were stopped in a routine check.

Remaining at large were Paul Marquez, 26, Los Angeles, a narcotics violator, and Gerald E. Baucum, 27, San Francisco, sentenced for robbery.

The men escaped from the prison road camp in Siskiyou county and stole a Cessna light plane. They flew to Medford, Ore., where they abandoned the craft several hours later at the Medford airport. Oregon authorities had launched a wide search for the escapees in rugged area near Roseburg, Ore., without success.

Hitchhiked
The FBI office in Los Angeles said the captured convicts had hitchhiked from Oregon to lower California after abandoning the plane. The pair reportedly spent some time in Tijuana, Mex., before returning to California and making their way to here yesterday.

Morgan and Virgil were taken to the San Bernardino county jail. They were scheduled for arraignment this afternoon before Federal Judge N. E. Peters.

Several Hundred Ask For Absentee Ballots

Several hundred requests for absentee ballots have been received by the Jackson county election department according to election officials. These absentee ballots are air mailed immediately upon request.

Deadline for registering to vote in the Nov. 6 general election is Oct. 6 at 8 p.m. with the deadline for mailing absentee ballots not later than Oct. 26. Mrs. Bereth Hopkins, county clerk, reminded residents.

The absentee ballots must be received in the county clerk's office not later than Oct. 31. The ballots for this year's election were sent to the printers last Friday, according to Mrs. Hopkins.

500 GOP Leaders Attend Gettysburg Pep Rally Today

Says Lot at Stake In 1956 Election

Gettysburg, Pa. — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower told Republican leaders in his opening campaign speech today that Republicans, independents and "discerning" Democrats "can, should, must be persuaded to vote Republican" this fall.

Mr. Eisenhower spoke to more than 500 key Republican leaders from every state, gathered for a party pep meeting in a large circus-like tent on a green rolling pasture a short distance from his Gettysburg farm home.

Mr. Eisenhower told them that "there is so much at stake" in the 1956 election campaign that "we dare leave nothing to chance or happenstance."

Lists Basic Objectives

"Every Republican, every independent, every discerning Democrat, every thinking citizen regardless of his past or present political record, can, should, must be persuaded to vote Republican on Nov. 6," he declared.

Mr. Eisenhower said there are four basic GOP objectives in the campaign:

1. "To arouse in the American people a consciousness of all that is at stake in this election, of their responsibility and their ability in making sure we stay on the straight road of prosperity, progress and peace."

2. "To generate in them the conviction that our party, the party of the future, is best fitted for the management of our government because of its principles and record and the candidates it presents for office from village to national level."

Builders of Future
3. "To ignite in them a zeal to make converts among their neighbors, to be themselves active workers for the Republican party and builders of the American future."

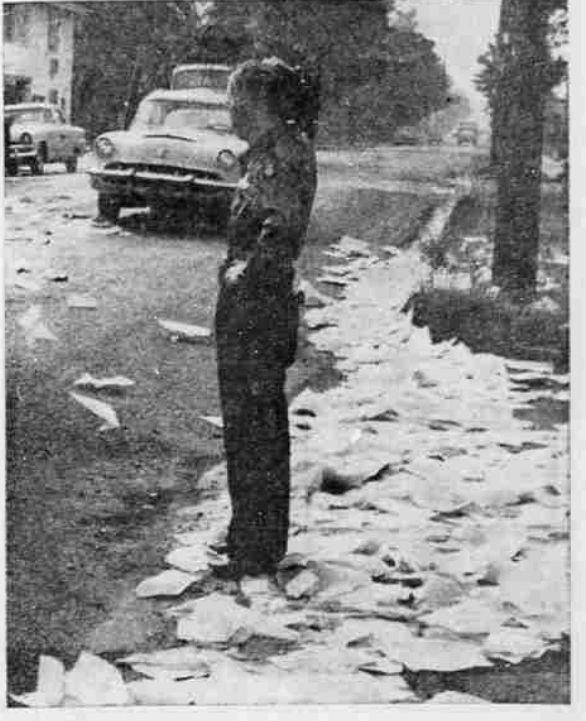
4. "To fortify their determination that this year they will register in time and get others to register; to vote themselves and persuade others to vote."

Mr. Eisenhower restated his concern over the failure of some Republicans to register. And he drummed repeatedly on the idea that party leaders must concentrate in the next few weeks in getting every possible potential supporter registered. He called this "the first order of business" for all Republicans.
