Lake Forest, Ill. — (U.P.) — Bob Ross Jr., San Francisco, slammed his second shot four feet from the pin today and dropped the putt for a birdie three to eliminate favorite Ken Venturi, also of San Francisco, from the National Amateur Golf Tournament, 1 up, in a third round match.

Lake Forest, Ill. — (U.P.) — The Pacific Northwest was without a contender today as the National Amateur Golf tournament rolled into its third round after both remaining entrants fell in yesterday's play.

Ken Venturi of San Francisco posted a 4 and 2 win over Bruce Cudd, former Walker Cup player from Portland yesterday.

Dick Yost, of Portland and Seattle, also fell in yesterday's second round of play. Yost lost on the 18th hole to Pete Dye of Indianapolis.

Lake Forest, Ill. — (U.P.) — Survival in the National Amateur golf championship depended on stamina as much as ability today, with the field of 64 slugging into two 18-hole rounds to cut the challengers to 16 before tonight.

Most of the top favorites, defending champion E. Harvie Ward Jr., Ken Venturi, Billy Jo Patton, both Joe and Bill Campbell, Bob Sweeney, Rex Baxter, Dale Morey and Rick Jones, still were in contention, even though 136 players have been eliminated.

Three Other Champs

Three other former titleholders still were in the running—Charles Coe, the 1949 winner, Willie Turnesa, who won in 1938 and 1948, and Dick Chapman, the 1940 champion. Other "name" players still in action included Charles Kocsis, Don Cherry and Jim Tom Blair.

At least one of the "names" was to go out in today's first round as Kocsis, a former national collegiate champion, collides with Chapman.

Hollywood Whacks Angels To Regain PCL 3rd Spot As Portland Drops 2 Tilts

Relief Ace Bob Anderson, challenging Los Angeles Angel teammates Steve Bilko and Gene Mauch for the most valuable player award, topped the Pacific Coast league record for season appearances on the mound last night when he appeared in his 70th game of the season.

But Anderson, who has won 12 and lost four, and more important has saved 26 games for the pennant-winning Angels, came in too late to save it last night. The Stars, season-long jinxes for the Angels.

It was the Stars' fifth straight win over the Angels and boosted them back into third place. In other games last night, 10, 167 fans turned out at Portland to watch the Beavers make a final bid to replace Seattle in second place. But the Rainiers swept a pair, taking the first game 5-4 in 11 innings and coping the night can 2-0.

Solons Down Padres
The Sacramento Solons, still fighting to bust into the first division, knocked over San Diego 6-4. A doubleheader scheduled at Vancouver between the Mounties and the San Francisco Seals was rained out.

At Los Angeles, Anderson took over in the eighth after the Stars had knocked out starter Bob Thorpe. He gave up two hits and no runs the rest of the way. And when he threw the first pitch he erased the mark of 69 set by Milo Candini with the Oakland Oaks in 1952 for pitching appearances in a single season.

Hollywood's triumph gave the

Stars a 14-9 season mark against their neighboring rivals. Paul Pettit led the attack with a pair of singles and a home run good for three RBIs.

Luis Arroyo 7-6, went all the way for the win giving up eight hits including Gale Wade's 19th home run.

Kennedy Gets Win
Bill Kennedy pitched air-tight relief ball the last 3 2/3 of the first game for Seattle and drove in the winning run in the 11th with a double. The Rainiers had battled back to tie it in the eighth on Joe Taylor's three-run homer. Kennedy, 2-4, struck out six in relief and gave up just one hit for the win.

The Rainiers scored both their runs in the fifth inning of the nightcap which was halted after six because of a curfew rule.

Artie Wilson's sacrifice fly brought in one run and Jack Lohrke singled in the other.

Shortstop Joe Koppe was the hero in Sacramento's win as he drove in five of the Solons six runs with two homers and a sacrifice fly. Glenn Elliott picked up his fifth win against three losers.

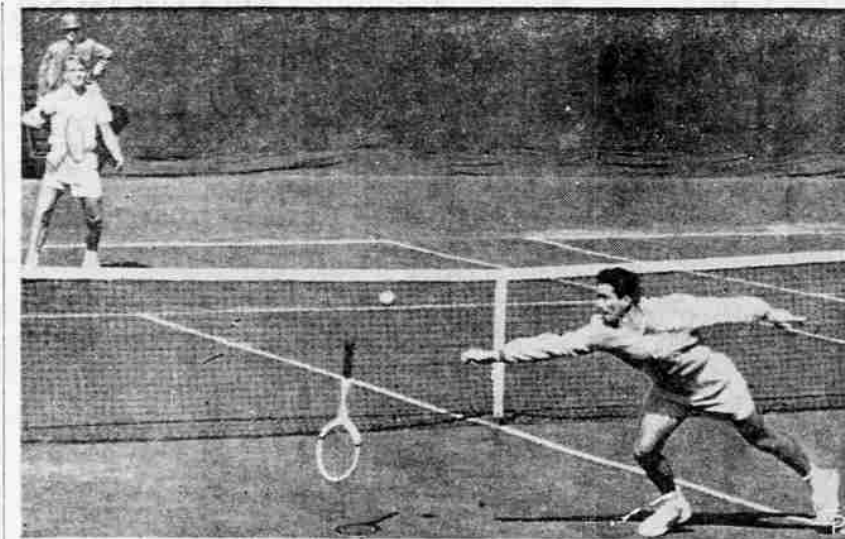

Syracuse, N.Y. — (U.P.) — Belated public appreciation that Johnny Saxton is indeed the world welterweight champion finally hammered the betting

price down to "even money" for his first defense of the recapitulated crown tonight against ex-champ Carmen Basilio.

And the trend of the year's heaviest fight-wagering indicated 26-year-old Johnny would be favored when they enter the ring at War Memorial auditorium at 10 p.m. (EDT) for their return 15-round TV title go.

Twenty-nine-year-old Basilio, the former union farmer of nearby Chittenango, N.Y., has been favored at odds ranging down from 9-5 despite his controversial loss of the 147-pound title to Saxton of New York at the Chicago stadium, March 14.

Johnny Confident

Johnny, who flew in Tuesday night from his training camp at Summit, N.J., exuded confidence.

The rangy Negro, who developed from an impoverished orphan to a two-time champion, said:

"I'm much sharper now than when I beat Basilio in March. I've had three bouts under my belt since then. And remember, I always do better in my second fights with opponents—like I did with Tiger Jones, Joe Meloni and Gil Turner."

Copromoters Norman Rothchild and Jim Norris lowered their sights a bit from the sell-out target of \$150,000 and said they expected about 8,000 fans and \$140,000, in addition to the \$75,000 from television and radio.

Prothro Praises Work of Sophs

Corvallis, Ore. — (U.P.) — Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro praised the work of sophomore guards Jack Hogan and Sonny Sanches who he said were pressing a pair of lettermen for starting positions.

Prothro cut workouts to one a day Tuesday, the first let-up in the twice-a-day schedule since practice got underway. The Beavers worked on stopping the split-T offense of their first opponent, Missouri.

Morris Sidelined By Leg Injury

Waldorf also worked fullback Jim Cherry at guard and Joe Oliva, a guard, at tackle.

Milwaukee Club Rehires Haney

New York — (U.P.) — The Milwaukee Braves have rehired Manager Fred Haney for the 1957 season.

Haney who took over the Braves on June 16 when Charley Grimm was fired, conferred here Tuesday with General Manager John Quinn before the club announced that the 58-year-old pilot had been offered a new contract.

Quinn said the new contract was "an expression of appreciation for the wonderful job he (Haney) has done." The meeting took place shortly before the start of the Brooklyn-Milwaukee series of two games.
