

Recount in Maine Vote Is Possibility

Augusta, Me. — (U.P.) — Secretary of State Paul A. MacDonold said today it would be easy for either candidate in Maine's hairbreadth congressional election to seek a recount.

In the race Monday, Democrat James P. Oliver apparently ousted veteran Republican U. S. Rep. Robert Hale from his first district seat by 90 votes.

The vote was so close that both candidates agreed a recount was certain.

MacDonold said his office is responsible for conducting recounts and that candidates wishing to get action must file a petition to such the recount.
