TV Star's Clothes Important As Material for Performances

New York—Clyde Martin, a Broadway tailor who specializes in clothes calls, believes the material he puts on the backs of TV stars is as important as the material that goes into their shows.

Along the Stern, Martin is known as the man who drapes the curious shapes of such sartorial sugarplums as Frankie Sinatra, Jackie Gleason and Steve Allen. When Martin's present store unlatched its doors three years ago, Martin supplied the customers with Kleig lights, potables, a buffet supper and such temporary salesmen as Milton Berle, Jack E. Leonard and Sammy Davis, Jr.

"I dress them all," boasts Martin proudly. "Jerry Lewis buys in here and so does Buddy Hackett, the Ames Brothers and Sugar Ray Robinson.

TV People in Hurry

"I have Billy Daniels as a customer and Myron Cohen. When Phil Silvers needed some civilian clothes for his Bilko series, I sold him a sports jacket and slacks."

Outfitting show people can be a lucrative business, but it pre-

sents its problem, said Martin. "They're in a hurry. They want a suit in 24, 48 hours. Once, Frank Sinatra ordered six suits in such a hurry, my designer had to sew them on the train making the delivery."

"Now, you take Jackie Gleason. He must have 100 suits in his closet, but he'll suddenly want a new suit made for him overnight. Once he had me make a cashmere trenchcoat and another time, a mohair trenchcoat. Can you imagine? The mohair one is still hanging in my store—he's waiting for an occasion to wear it."

Gleason's weight fluctuates between fat and impossible and as a result, Martin must keep three different sets of measurements on him. "His tastes change, too," said Martin. "He'll go into one period where he'll wear bold plaids and hound's tooth checks and then he'll switch to banker's grays."

Comic Jack E. Leonard also has a weight problem. "He walked into my store the other day

and said it was the first time he was ever able to pick clothes off a rack."

Martin tries to dress his customers in keeping with the times. "Jerry Lewis we try to make unique in some way—we put cuffs on his sleeves or slant the pockets of his coat. Millie Berle has become very conservative recently—he's gotten away from big shoulders. Sammy Davis has a tendency to put his hands in his pockets, so we don't put any pockets in his suits."

Comedian Myron Cohen has a fear of wrinkling his show suits. "So we make him a stand-up suit," said Martin. "It's so stiff he can't sit down."

But no matter how greatly performers differ on suits they pick, they all seem to have the same taste on one article—pajamas.

"All TV stars buy a pajama bottoms. No tops. I got five dozen tops in my store," said Martin. "If I can find just one guy with a yen for tops he's really got himself a deal."

Justice Department Could Enter School Problem, Ike Says

Washington—(AP)—President Eisenhower said Tuesday the justice department will respond to any call for help from a local federal district judge who feels that his school integration orders are being defied.

Mr. Eisenhower made the statement at his news conference when asked to spell out what "formula" he would apply to determine when federal intervention is necessary in a school integration dispute.

The President said the first step would be for a federal district court to decide that "someone is in contempt of that court."

Violators Face Jail

"At that point I think it is customary for the court to call in the justice department to assist in bringing out the evidence and the case out," he said.

"If anyone is in contempt, I assume that it is the job of the U.S. marshal to serve the warrants and to take the men, the offenders, to jail or to pay their fines or whatever happens," he said.

Mr. Eisenhower emphasized that it would be up to the local court to initiate a contempt proceeding because "I know of no way from this distance that those things can be determined."

Deplores Violence

Deplores "violence" in school disputes in some areas, Mr. Eisenhower volunteered high praise for Louisville, Ky., where integration of public schools was carried out earlier this week with little trouble.

The President said Omer Carmichael, superintendent of schools at Louisville, "must be a very wise man."

He said he had read that "this man Carmichael campaigned for two years in an educational program" to prepare students and their parents for trouble-free integration.

Southern States Get Fair Weather

Fair weather was expected over the southern half of the nation today, but cooler air was to invade the northern tier of states from the Dakotas to the upper Great Lakes.

Weathermen are watching the fourth tropical storm of the season, Dora, as it develops in the Gulf of Mexico. The storm center was expected to reach the Mexican coast near Tampico sometime today.

A few locally heavy thunderstorms were reported in Northern Minnesota in advance of the cold front pushing southeastward out of Canada. Thunderstorms also were expected to spread through the Western Plains in front of the colder air.

Considerable shower activity was reported from the Northwest from Idaho eastward into Montana and Wyoming, with showers forecast for the area again today.

Ground fog was widespread and limited visibility over much of the Great Lakes area during the night.

Temperatures last night ranged in the north half of the nation in the 50s and 60s, with 70s common from Kansas and Missouri southward. Nighttime temperatures in the Desert Southwest hovered near the 90-degree mark.

Some early morning readings were Boston, 64; Detroit, 60; New Orleans, 70; Bismarck, North Dakota, 59; Seattle, 56 and San Francisco, 59.
