

# Adlai Discusses Campaign With Party Heads of Eastern States

New York — (UP) — Adlai E. Stevenson huddled with eastern Democratic leaders today to get their advice on campaign strategy.

Party bigwigs from Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, New York, West Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia to talk tactics with the Democratic presidential nominee.

It was the last in a series of eight regional parleys that Stevenson and his running mate, Sen. Estes Kefauver, have held around the country in an air tour of almost 12,000 miles in two weeks.

Of the six states represented here today, only West Virginia

fell into the Democratic column in 1952. But Stevenson's lieutenants have high hopes of doing better in this Mid-Atlantic region this year—particularly in Pennsylvania.

Stevenson will make an off-the-record talk here tonight at a fund-raising dinner, and then take a plane to Harrisburg, Pa., where he will deliver his official campaign "kickoff" speech on Thursday night.

**Gets Rousing Reception**

Stevenson got a rousing reception Tuesday night at the Liberal Party convention here, which nominated him and Kefauver to head its ticket too.

An estimated 3,500 persons rocked the hall with laughter and applause when Stevenson attacked the Eisenhower administration in a speech loaded with quips.

He charged that Vice President Richard M. Nixon was putting on "a new face" and is trying to convince the voters that "everything he has said and done in past years bears no relation to himself."

Stevenson said in sarcasm that there should be some word from Nixon "repudiating the irresponsible, vindictive and malicious words so often spoken by the imposter who has been using his name all these years."

**Attacks Nixon**

Nixon also came under indirect attack from Kefauver, who said if he is elected vice president he will not "have to spend any of my time apologizing for my conduct while seeking the votes of the American people."

Stevenson criticized President Eisenhower's news conference remark a week ago that "it makes no difference whether or not I endorse" the Supreme Court's decision on school desegregation.

The Democratic candidate said the President should "do all in his power to create a climate of compliance with the law and to encourage" people "who are earnestly trying, often in difficult circumstances, to comply with the court's decision."

# Young Accident Victim Home From Hospital

Wayne Taylor, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo L. Taylor of 1625 Grand ave., returned home Sunday from Rogue Valley hospital.

He had been confined to the hospital since Aug. 7, with critical injuries suffered in a bicycle-car accident at the corner of Crater Lake ave. and Grand ave.

He was injured internally by the hood ornament of the car and had to undergo major surgery on his stomach and spleen. He also received two broken legs. At the time of the accident the blood supply in Medford was almost exhausted and some blood for the 7-year-old boy had to be obtained from Ashland, according to the local red cross chapter.

The following day the Bloodmobile made its visit to Medford and a total of 243 pints of blood was donated, the red cross said. This was the first time that the quota had been reached in a year. The red cross said many people are reported to have donated blood in the boy's name.

**Home Instruction**

He was scheduled to enter the second grade at Jefferson school this year, but will not be able to for an indefinite period, relatives said. Instead he will be receiving home teaching, a service supplied by the Medford schools for children who must be confined in hospitals or homes for a long period.

The 7-year-old boy is the grandson of Mrs. Maude Power, 100 Vancouver ave., and Mrs. Laura Taylor, 26 Portland ave.

# City Administrative Changes Set at Salem

Salem — (UP) — Administrative changes in four city departments that will save taxpayers about \$10,000 a year were approved by the Salem city council Monday night.

Changes will consolidate the office of city recorder and city treasurer. A clarification of duties to prevent overlapping will also affect the city health and purchasing department.

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
