

Committee Report On Junior Colleges Received by Board

Salem — (U.P.) — Report of a joint committee studying junior colleges was accepted late yesterday by the Oregon State Board of Higher Education and the State Board of Education.

The boards agreed to sponsor legislation which would straighten out ambiguities in the two state laws under which junior colleges can be started — the Dunn bill of 1949 and the Junior College Act of 1951.

Recommended was repeal of the Dunn bill and inclusion of its provisions in an amended junior college law which would recognize junior colleges as an extension of the public school system.

New Legislation
Under new legislation the proposed junior colleges would be financed and administered by local school districts with supplementary funds supplied by the state.

The committee, formed in 1955, and headed by Clyde H. Beard, principal of The Dalles

high school, agreed that establishment of junior colleges in a number of Oregon communities would be a partial solution to pressing enrollment problems faced by public and private colleges.

With amended legislation, junior colleges might be established in cities like Astoria, Coos Bay, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Pendleton, Baker and Ontario.

Oregon now has only one junior college, the Central Oregon Community college at Bend, which has been operating under the Dunn bill since 1949. It receives no state aid.

The boards, meeting in their annual joint session, were told by committee member Dr. Robert Wiegman of Portland State college that junior colleges would be particularly valuable for technical work, transfer work for students who intend to continue through college, and adult education.

Special Appropriation.
A special appropriation was

recommended to provide partial annuities. The schools' enrollment support for the Bend Community college during the next bi-according to R. E. Jewell, superintendent of Bend public schools and the community college.

First Satellite Set for Early '57

London — (U.P.) — The automobile capital of the world will turn out its first gold-plated earth satellite early in 1957, satellite manufacturer Howard Perkins said Tuesday.

The man whose Detroit firm is making the basketball-sized earth satellite the United States will attempt to orbit next year told newsmen here he expected the first model to be completed about Jan. 1.

Perkins said, a "substantial" portion of the polished magnesium outer space spheres interior will be plated with "almost pure gold."

Perkins reviewed details of the satellite project released recently by the Office of Naval Research in the United States.

He said his company plans to make about 15 or 20 of the metal balls, 20 inches in diameter, which scientists hope will orbit at 18,000 miles an hour hundreds of miles above the earth's surface.

Some of the initial spheres will be used for testing, Perkins said. Naval Research plans to rocket-launch one of them as close to July 1, 1957, as possible.

The magnesium expert said much of the tubular bracing and instrument casing inside the four-pound hollow ball will be plated with almost pure gold because of gold's stable chemical qualities.

Delicate instruments inside the sphere will record and transmit to earth data on outer space, scientists hope.

Proposed amendments would permit organization of additional school districts for junior college purposes only. They would further enable school districts operating junior colleges with students from outside the district to charge back to the school district where the student resides the difference between the per capita cost of operating the junior college and the tuition received from the student.

Also recommended would be an amendment enabling school districts to contract with the general extension division to organize a junior college. Then any time within a five-year limit when the district program met legal requirements the school could come under the junior college law.

Some requirements retained from the junior college bill would be a true cash valuation of 20-million dollars enrollments

in grades 9 to 12 of 500 pupils, and available building space.

The state board of higher education would pass on proposed courses.

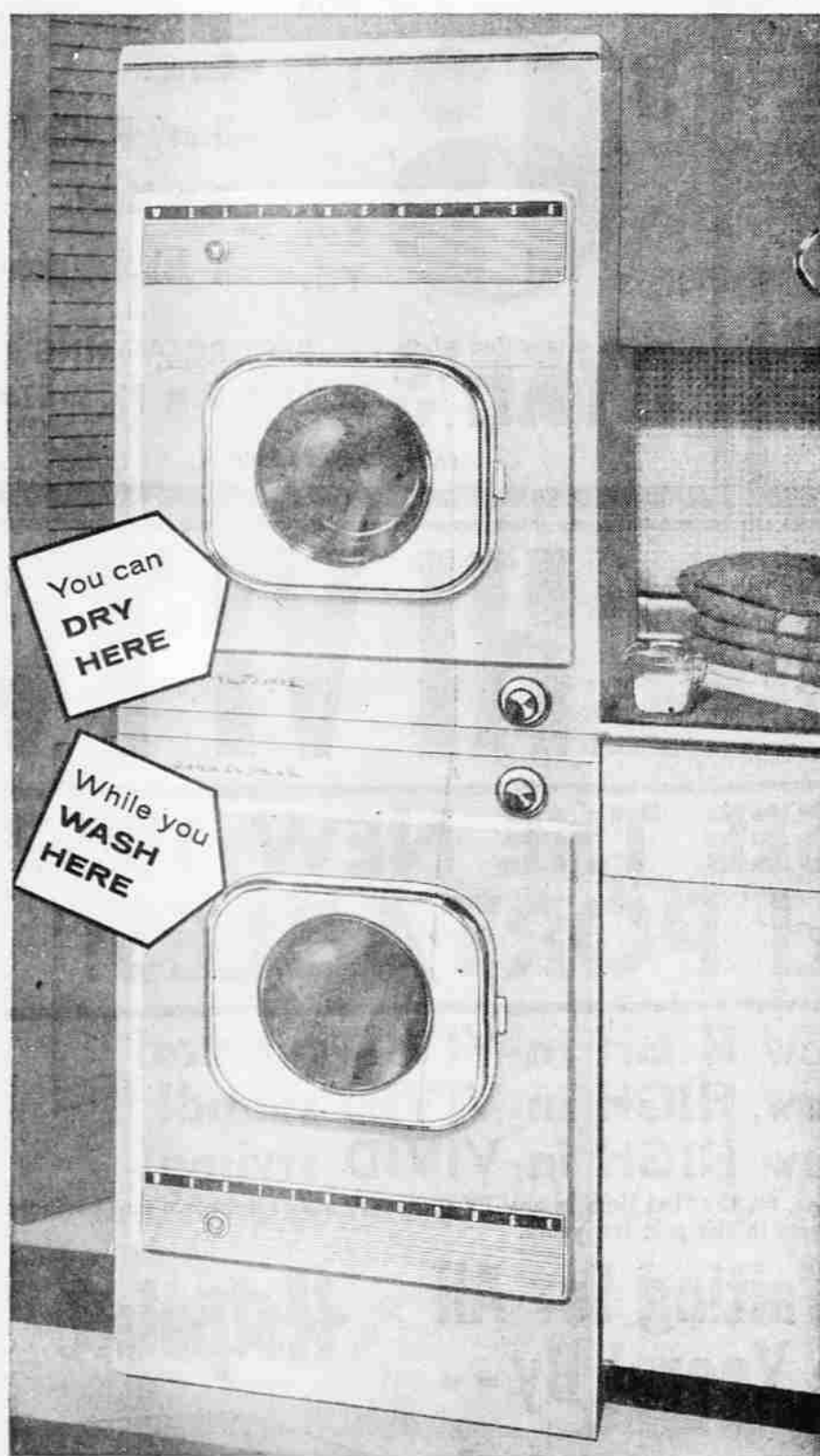
Fisherman Drowns When Boat Capsizes

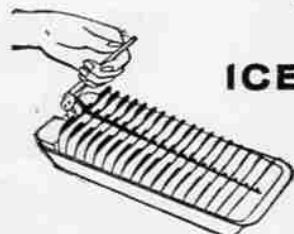
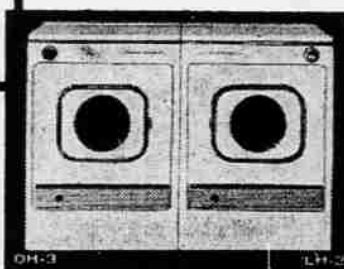
