

BRAVES GRAB 2 FROM PHILS AS AARON BATS IN 4 RUNS

Milwaukee had a two-game lead today and heroes by the handful but all of them were overshadowed by hammerin' Hank Aaron, who all but nailed down the National League baseball flag himself single-handedly Thursday night.

The 22-year-old Aaron, making a spectacular bid for the Most Valuable Player award, was little short of magnificent in leading the Braves to a two-night doubleheader sweep over the battling Phillies Thursday night.

1. He tripled home the winning run in Milwaukee's 13-inning 3-2 victory in the opener.

2. He smashed his 25th homer in the 11th inning of the nightcap to put the Braves ahead and after Ted Kazanski's homer tied the score in the bottom of the frame, Aaron came up again and.

3. Delivered a sacrifice fly with the bases loaded to give the Braves a 4-3 triumph in the 12-inning finale.

All told, Aaron drove in four runs and was such a standout that he easily eclipsed such other developments as Warren Spahn registering the 200th victory of his career in the nightcap and outfielder Bobby Thomson's pair of spectacular throws which saved both the first and second games.

Spahn gave up only six hits, including homers by Jim Green, Andy Seminick and Kazanski in joining the ranks of the 200-game winners and posting his 17th triumph of the season.

Thomson, fined \$100 only last Wednesday for an unauthorized and unsuccessful attempt to steal home, threw out Willie Jones in the 12th inning of the opener when Jones tried to score on Del Ennis' single, and then cut down Richie Ashburn at the plate in the ninth inning of the nightcap on another single by Ennis.

Rookie Taylor Phillips, who entered the opener in the sixth in relief of Bog Trowbridge, blanked the Phils the rest of the way for his fifth victory. Robin Roberts started the nightcap for the Phils but gave way after 11 innings and Ben Flowers was charged with the loss.

The third-place Cincinnati Redlegs gained a half-game on the idle second-place Brooklyn Dodgers with a 5-4 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Rookie Frank Robinson's ninth-inning single scored Ray Jablonski with the winning run. Joe Nuxhall gained his 12th win in relief while Roy Face was the loser. George Crowe and Frank Thomas hit homers.

In the only other National league game, Vinegar Bend Mizell of the Cardinals pitched his second straight shutout to defeat the Giants, 5-0. Rip Repul-

ski and Ken Boyer each homered while a pair of ex-Giants, Whitey Lockman and Ray Katt drove in the other three runs between them. Al Worthington was the loser.

The Yankees, continuing their cakewalk to the American league flag, defeated the Athletics, 3-2, to move 11 games in front again. Mickey Mantle's 48th homer in the third inning, his first circuit clout this month, turned out to be the winning margin as southpaw Whitey Ford doled out five hits for his 18th triumph.

No. 20 For Pierce
Left-hander Billy Pierce of the White Sox became the American League's first 20-game winner with a 10-inning 4-3 victory over the Red Sox. Ron Northey's pinch single in the 10th drove in Nellie Fox from second base as Tom Brewer was thwarted in quest of his 20th triumph. Jim Rivera's seventh-inning homer gave Chicago a 3-2 lead but Jim Piersall's ninth-inning homer sent the game into extra innings.

Two homers by Gus Triandos, his 17th and 18th of the campaign, paced the Orioles to a 4-1 decision over the second-place Indians. Triandos belted both of his homers off rookie Hank Aguirre, a 24-year-old left hander. Cleveland is expecting big things from next year. Lanky Connie Johnson struck out nine and gave up five hits, including a homer by Bobby Avila, in posting his eighth triumph.

Ray Boone hammered out four hits and Paul Foytack hurled five-hit ball in leading the Tigers to their seventh straight victory, a 7-2 win over the Senators. The triumph gave Foytack a season slate of 13 and 12. Chuck Stobbs dropped his 12th decision against 13 victories.

Darrell Royal Rebuilding Washington Gridiron Club

Seattle—(U.P.)—The Washington Huskies not only are out of the Rose Bowl for two years because of conference code violations but also badly out of pocket as far as experience goes.

A total of 13 lettermen graduated from the team which ended fifth in the Pacific Coast conference standings last year while a 14th, left guard Ed Sheron, apparently is finished because a knee operation failed to relieve some trouble.

Another troublemaker, Bill Till, is restricted to playing in five games as one of the team's four seniors who look unwarranted financial aid.

Rebuilding Job
Graduation took care of the entire right side of the line as well as front line quarterbacks Sandy Lederman and Steve Roake. So Darrell Royal, who replaced Johnny Cherberg as coach, is faced with a big rebuilding job while the former Husky mentor works on his political fences as Democratic candidate for the state's lieutenant governorship.

However, there are some bright spots. Corky Lewis, rated one of the best ends on the coast, is returning to his post on the left side. Other seasoned veterans are fullback Credell (Incredible) Green, halfback Jim Jones, left tackle George Struger and halfback Bob Dunn.

Lewis has rolled up 888 minutes of varsity football as he heads into his final year. Green can power up the middle in a way reminiscent of Southern California's Arny Schindler. Jones has speed while the 233-pound Struger is expected to give Washington the best tackle combination on the coast when he teams up with 240-pound Dick Day, a junior.

Dunn had moments of greatness during the 1954 season then fell by the wayside last year with injuries. His passing has looked pretty sharp in recent sessions.

Look Impressive
The regular quarterback berth seems in the hands of Al Ferguson. Royal also has had some brighter moments watching the long gainers of Don Millich, a 19-year-old sophomore fullback from Aberdeen, Wash. Dean Derby, a reliable operator of two years experience, also is back

for a half back job.

Another soph who may snag a fulltime job is Duane Snell of Tacoma, who has looked impressive at the right end.

The guard posts may be nailed down by Dave Leland and Bill Ochs, who warmed the bench most of last year. Reese Lindquist has the center job providing Sophomores Marv Bergman and Rene Bertheau don't ace him out.

The Huskies open with four straight home games which could help get the club off to the right start in their first season as a fulltime, split-T outfit.

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Drag Racing Season Ends With CW Event on Sunday

Drag racing season locally winds up Sunday with the final program of the Southern Oregon Timing association at their Camp White strip.

Entrants will be out to beat the 111.11 miles per hour top time of the season as well as the two-year-old track record of 120.84.

Delegations from northern California, as well as throughout Oregon, will be on hand to compete. Entries are anticipated in 12 to 13 classes. There will be trophies for winners in each of the categories as well as for top eliminator automobile and motorcycle.

Vehicles will start timing at 10 a.m. First drags will be after lunch. No entries will be taken after noon unless the prospective contestant has traveled from a point more distant than 150 miles from Medford.

Spectators are welcome to the drags and there will be soft drinks and sandwiches for sale at the concessions stand. Cars are timed on a one-fourth mile strip off Crater Lake highway in west Camp White. The strip

is seven miles from Medford. SOTA will accept contributions from fans at the Sunday event. The money will go toward improvement of drag racing here. Association members hope eventually to own their own strip and add conveniences for spectators.

September 2 drag activities at Camp White were highlighted by the entry of a "dragster" for the first time this season. The sleek little machine built and entered by the Shafers club, Eureka, turned in the 111.11 mph time which is second only to Jerry Lausmann's 1954 mark on the local strip. The dragster was powered by a full-race supercharged Ford flathead engine.
