London—Socialist member of Parliament F. J. Beilenger during the debate on the Suez canal:

Harrisburg, Pa.—Democratic presidential nominee Adlai E. Stevenson the "part-time presidency" after expressing sympathy for the circumstances that created it.

Shakespeare Plays Draw Many Outside Rogue Valley

Ashland—This was "visitors" year at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, according to Bill Patton, general manager. Compilation of figures showing where playgoers come from indicate an increase of up to 139 per cent from points outside the valley, but a drop in local attendance in 1956, Patton said.

Final ticket count for the past season was 19,816, Patton said, with gate passes to members of the press and others estimated to have taken the attendance to well over 20,000.

Patton's figures on attendance from various localities, based on mail orders and tabulations at the box office, indicated visitors from California, especially the bay area, showed a 113 per cent increase; Oregon cities outside of the Rogue valley marked up a total increase of 29 per cent; Washington, 69 per cent, and visitors from remote parts of the United States and foreign countries, 139 per cent.

Total attendance for the year, from outside the Rogue valley, was up 64 per cent.

Largest decrease was shown in Medford, where 28 per cent fewer season's memberships were sold, and where cash sales were off 21 per cent from 1955. Ashland showed losses of 18 per cent in memberships. Tabulations of Ashland cash sales were not shown, but Patton estimated that these were also lower.

Total attendance for the season was off by only 427 from 1955, despite a very slow start because of cold and rainy weather and a complete loss of one performance, "Romeo and Juliet," because of storm damage.

Magnuson Sees Need For Controlling Eel

Seattle—(U.P.)—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said Thursday unless the lamprey eel is controlled in the Columbia river it may pose the same threat to fisheries on that stream as it does in the Great Lakes region.

Magnuson said an international treaty has been necessary with Canada to get a cooperative lamprey eel control program underway on the Great Lakes.

Thornton said that the county registrar could set up some other definite place to register voters, but could not register them door-to-door.



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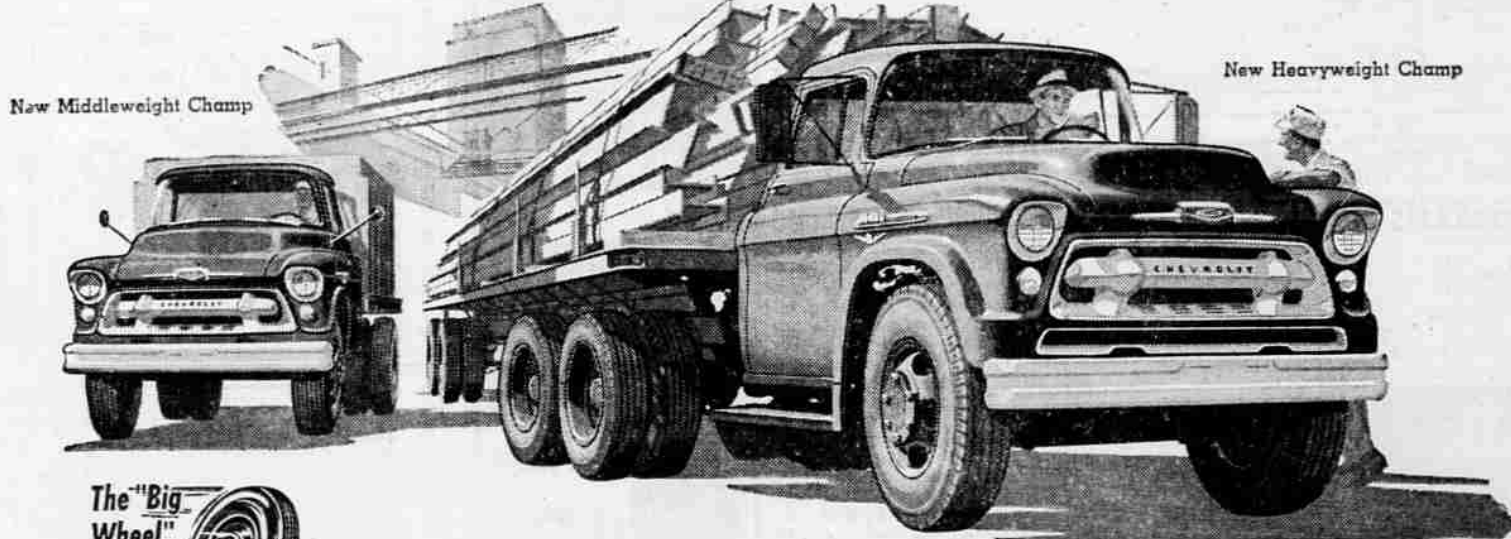
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
