

Mrs. Roosevelt Discusses Canal

Detroit — (U.P.) — Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt said Thursday this nation probably could have prevented Egypt from seizing the Suez Canal by "speaking up when Egypt first stopped Israeli ships using the canal."

Because of this lack of early action, she said, "We may find ourselves in a position where other people start shooting and we have to join in."

Mrs. Roosevelt discussed the Suez situation Thursday while touring the General Motors Corp. Technical Center.

Five Killed When Car, Truck Collide

Panama City, Fla. — (U.P.) — An old car and a pickup truck rammed together in a twisted heap at an intersection late Thursday night, killing five persons and injuring three others seriously.

None of the survivors could talk and highway patrolmen investigating the tangled vehicles could not tell which ran through the stop sign at the rural intersection five miles from here. There were no other witnesses.

Mail Tribune Business Office Hums With Activity

The Mail Tribune business office is in the center of the plant at 27 North Fir st. It is under the news room, in front of the composing and press rooms, and next to the advertising department.

Behind the office front counter are two girls who take classified ads. The two, Miss Betty Harris, 1955 graduate of Phoenix High school, and Miss Diann Reich, 1955 graduate of Medford High school, receive ads for the newspaper's classified section, either in person or over the phone.

are at desks behind the "ad girls." Mrs. Brown, a four-year employee of the business office, keeps tabs on starting and stopping dates for each ad. Miss Peters takes care of legal publications and does the billing to monthly classified customers.

Behind the switchboard in the middle of the office is Miss Dorothy Goode, a member of the 1956 graduating class at Phoenix High school. All telephone calls to any part of the building go through her switchboard. She learned its operations while on the job this summer.

Mrs. Margaret Hadley is display advertising bookkeeper for the paper. She works with the general accountant, Miss Alta Lindsey, in the accounting department. Across Miss Lindsey's desk pass all financial records and incoming money of the Medford Printing Company, which operates the Mail Tribune and radio station KYJC.

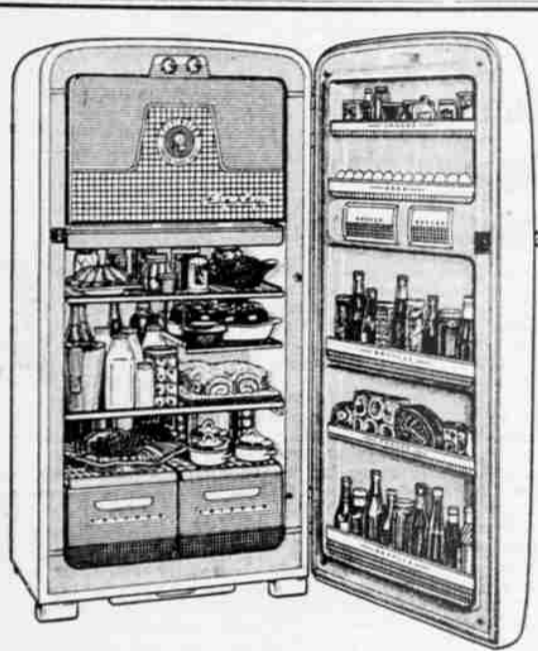
In charge of the business of

It is his overall duty to coordinate the operation of the news, business, advertising and production departments, and to order supplies and equipment for the entire newspaper operation.

Hearing Scheduled In Klamath Falls

Portland — (U.P.) — The senate interior and insular affairs committee has scheduled a hearing for October 18 in Klamath Falls on progress of the program for disposal of reservation assets of the Klamath Indians tribe. Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, a member of the committee, announced today.

Besides reviewing progress of the reservation termination pro-

gram, Neuberger said, testimony will be taken on possible legislation to correct inadequacies of the present law. He said the hearings are an outgrowth of a conference held in Washington, D.C., at which management specialists expressed the belief that terms of the present law threaten the existence of the vast stand of timber belonging to the Indians.
