Prior to her marriage, Miss Ikeda was graduated from the American Christian college in Japan and was employed as a secretary.

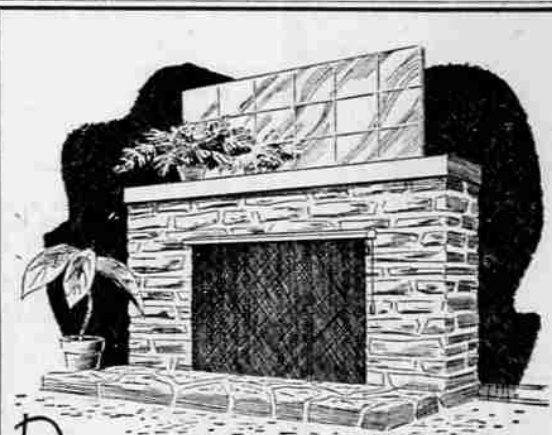
Mr. Conlon attended Medford schools and has been with the Navy for two years. He is currently working in the Navy post office in Yokohama where the couple are making their home.

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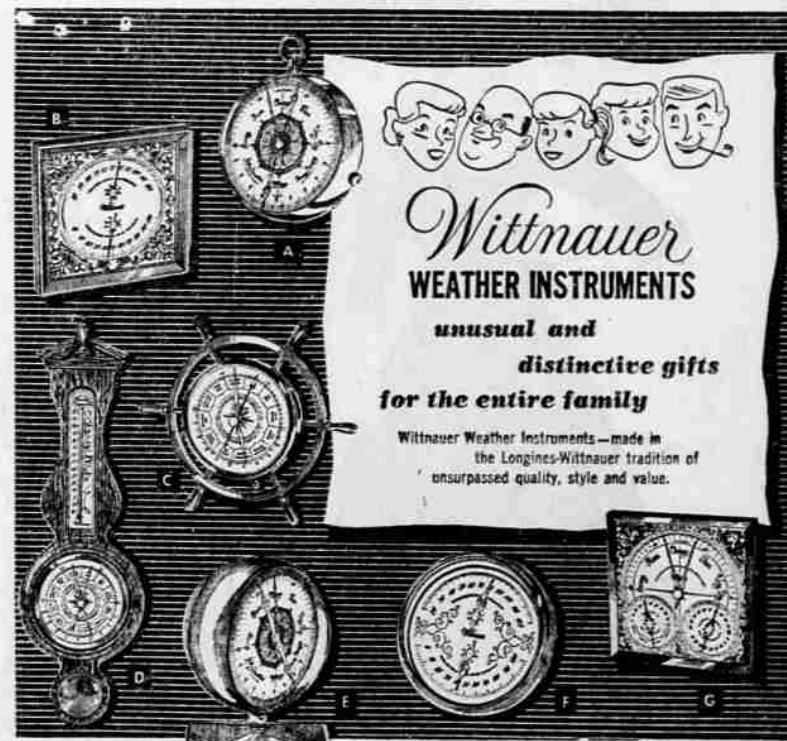
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
