

Tacoma To Appear Before High Court

Olympia—(UPI)—The city of Tacoma must show cause before the State Supreme court Sept. 21 why it should not be held in contempt of a court order against the Cowlitz river power project.

The hearing was asked by attorneys for the State Fish and Game departments, which challenged the \$138 million project on the grounds it would ruin a valuable salmon spawning area.

Joseph Mich, assistant attorney general, representing the two departments, filed a contention earlier this week that the city was violating an order issued last October by Judge Charles T. Wright of the Thurston county Superior court.

The order found the Cowlitz project illegal, but allowed Tacoma to proceed with construction of a coffer dam, provided

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
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
